## Texas Gal Seeks Honest Skunk

 NEW YORK (NEA)—Miss Barbara Allen, a tall blonde from Texas, is looking for a skunk. And not one of those alsy deodorized skunks, either. She wants an honest skunk, in full possession of all its smelly faculties.

Her odor craving is explained by her profession. She's an odor consultant and, consequently, has a profound interest in all things odoriferous.

Most of her work involves merchandising making things smell better so people will buy them—but her yearning for a skunk is purely scientific. She'd like to find out if chlorophyll tablets—which kill human odors—can make skunk's ingrown smell vanish, too.

"I finally located a skunk that hadn't been deodorized," she says, "but nobody would accept it for shipment. They wanted to be sure of the valuable forest resource from needless destruction by pests."

Avery S. Hoyt, the bureau chief, in a speech prepared for delivery to the western forestry and conservation association, pointed to the safety of the valuable forest resource from needless destruction by pests.

Hoyt said spraying, combined with freezing temperatures and woodpeckers, appear to have "broken the back" of the spruce beetle epidemic in Colorado forests.

Thornton T. Munger, former director of the Pacific Northwest forest and range experiment station, discussed forest slash burning. He told the 400 delegates from 11 western states and British Columbia that no blanket rule on burning could be laid down. The question is one which the forest manager must decide, he added.

He praised the tree farm program but urged better planning in harvesting mature tree crops. Some 15 to 25 percent of mature trees are over-ripe and are subject to insect infestation, he said. He urged increased cutting in such stands.

Kolbe reported that recent aerial surveys reveal there are about 550,000,000 board feet of pine timber in the western pine region of the U.S. That is considerably above the 1948 estimate of 481,000,000,000 feet, he said.

## Care Urged In Keeping Forests Up

Portland, (P)—Continued research, survey and control was urged here today by the chief of the federal bureau of entomology and plant quarantine to ensure safety of the valuable forest resource from needless destruction by pests.

More than 2,000,000 acres have been sprayed by plane in the past three years, he said.

Good, market conditions for lumber and other forest products have resulted in an incentive to grow trees as future crops, Ernest L. Kolbe, chief forester of the Western Pine Association, said yesterday.

He praised the tree farm program but urged better planning in harvesting mature tree crops. Some 15 to 25 percent of mature trees are over-ripe and are subject to insect infestation, he said. He urged increased cutting in such stands.
