

High School Dope Sales Shocks Texas Grand Jury

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., (AP)—A grand jury, shocked at revelations of marijuana sales in Wichita Falls schools, had this advice for parents today:

Keep your children at home. Find entertainment and recreation for them there. Chaperone their gatherings.

Limit the amount of money given your children.

Limit the use for pleasure purposes of the family automobile.

Know where your children are and "not just think you know where they are."

INDICTMENTS

With that advice, the jury yesterday indicted 10 persons on 21 counts in connection with marijuana sales in Wichita Falls schools.

Eight of those indicted are adults. The other two, although adults by legal definition, are high school students.

In all, 15 persons have been arrested. The other five are expected to be indicted in other cities.

Dist. Atty. Alan Staley estimates that 25 high school students were involved in possession or sale of the drug. Another seven to 10 junior high school students—in the 13-14 age bracket—may have been

Negroes Lose In Club Tilt

NEW YORK, (AP)—A police investigation has disclosed no evidence that the Stork club discriminated against Negro entertainer Josephine Baker.

The singer said club employees had discriminated against her and kept her waiting more than an hour for a meal on October 16. Police Commissioner George P. Monaghan yesterday made public a report prepared by an inspector who headed the investigation, giving details of interviews with the Baker party and persons at the club on the night concerned.

Monaghan said that as a result of the investigation "there is no basis for further action by the department in the matter."

The report said Walter White, executive secretary of the National Assoc. for the Advancement of Colored People, brought the original complaint which led to the investigation.

However, the report said, White and other NAACP officials agreed that the facts obtained by police were "insufficient to proceed in a criminal court."

Club personnel told police of delays in serving Miss Baker's food because a steak she wanted was not in stock and another steak had to be held until her wine was prepared.

QUANTICO, Va., (AP)—The nation's oldest living enlisted marine will say goodbye to the corps tomorrow.

All six battalions of troops at Quantico will pass in review before 76-year-old master sergeant Harry D. Bartley.

A native of Coalville, Pa., Bartley joined the corps in November of 1907. When he gives his final salute tomorrow he will be completing 44 years and seven days of continuous active duty.

He took part in campaigns in China and Santo Domingo in addition to two engagements in Haiti. He plans to work his one-acre chicken and produce farm in Dumfries, Va., where he and his wife now reside.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Paddy Young and Ernie Durando, two rock-throwing middleweights, resume their rivalry with a 10-round "rubber" match tonight at Madison Square Garden. The winner gets a January 25 non-title date with champion Sugar Ray Robinson.

Consumer Credit Curbs Policy Argued by Solons

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) today backed Eric Johnston's appeal for tougher consumer credit controls, but Sen. Welker (R-Idaho) said congress was wise in liberalizing the curbs.

Johnston made the appeal as he stepped aside as director of economic stabilization, a post he has held for 10 months. His successor, Roger L. Putnam, Massachusetts industrialist and former mayor of Springfield, was sworn in yesterday.

At a final news conference, Johnston said the government should be able to remove all direct economic controls within two years unless there is war.

Hiccup Champ Now Postal Employee

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Jack O'Leary, who has hiccuped once a second for most of the past three and a half years, was sworn in yesterday as a temporary postal employee.

O'Leary, 26, should know a good deal about mail. He has received 20,000 letters during his sickness—mostly home remedy cures for hiccups.

The former market manager has dropped in weight from 125 to 72 pounds since the seige started. He wants to earn enough money on the postal job to return to Phoenix, Ariz., a four-day respite from hiccuping.

O'Leary can't explain why his hiccups get better in Phoenix, but the fact that they do is enough for him.

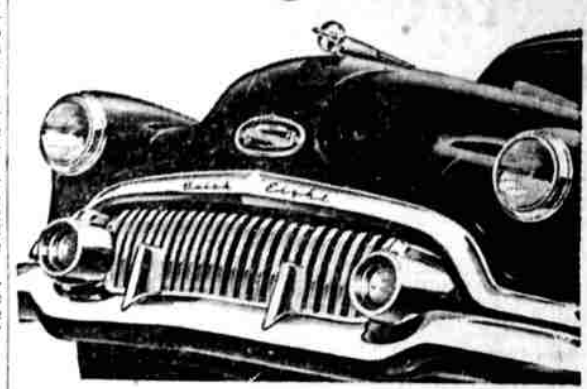

The Metropolitan Opera is on the air! That familiar line by Milton J. Cross will again be heard Saturdays at 11, beginning tomorrow. The first performance of the 1951-52 season will be "La Traviata," by Verdi. Licia Albanese plays the tragic role of "Violetta," with Giacinto Prandelli as "Alfredo" and Renato Capocci as his father, "Georgio Germont". The setting of "La Traviata" is in and around Paris, about 1850. Beautiful Violetta, who feels the first signs of a fatal illness, meets and falls in love with Alfredo, a young gentleman of distinguished family. The father, Georgio, complicates matters but the lovers are reunited and Violetta dies in Alfredo's arms.
