New Suggestion On Columbia Deal

PORTLAND—Gov. Len Jordan of Idaho thinks his state and the six bordering it should take over development of the Columbia river basin under a private financing program.

He told the western forestry and conservation association here last night that the time has come to "stop federal government expansion in the region until all avenues of development by private enterprise have been fully explored."

Jordan said if there was interest shown in his proposal he would invite the governors of the six states to discuss the formation of a commission—to be known as the interstate commission on the Columbia river basin.

He suggested that the governors prepare an integrated plan to be developed next year for submission to state legislatures.

Copco On Carpet Over Licenses

WASHINGTON—The California-Oregon Power company at Medford has 60 days in which to tell the power commission why it does not have a federal license for its hydro-electric developments on the Klamath river in Oregon and California.

The commission asked the explanation yesterday as an outgrowth of the firm's application for a license for a new project, the Big Bend development, in Oregon.

The firm is operating other developments without proper licenses, the commission said.

Man Shot, Hanged And Stabbed

ST. LOUIS—The nude body of an elderly man—shot, hanged and stabbed—was found in a St. Louis county cemetery yesterday.

Two youths found the body, which was hanging by a sash cord from a tree limb. A stab wound was in the throat and shotgun pellets were found in the abdomen and legs. A paring knife and clothes were found near the tree.

Sheriff's deputy Jake Pfeiffer said there were no marks of identification. He said the man was about 60 or 65 years old.

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Lumber Firm Wins Tax Refund Case

PORTLAND—A \$37,000 tax refund was ordered for the Sattian Lumber Co. by federal court jury and the award may set a precedent for other lumber firms to apply for refunds.

The federal tax collector had ordered the lumber company to pay a three percent tax on \$1,224,472 which the firm had paid to truck-

ers for hauling logs. The collector contended the truckers were individual operators and therefore subject to tax.

The company paid the tax under protest but filed suit to recover the money on grounds that the truckers were employees. The jury's verdict yesterday favored the company.
