In my opinion, nothing is so stimulating as a trip to San Francisco. There is so much to see and do that it is impossible to do everything one has planned.

I had planned to "do" the museums and art galleries, but the weather being simply impossible, I decided to confine my one day of sightseeing to the downtown area.

I saw a wonderful cross-section of work by San Francisco artists in the Rotunda Gallery at the City of Paris and much of it reminded me of our own exhibits here at the Art Center.

The paintings on display at Gump's were, I feel, avant-garde. It seems they go out of their way to select the most modernistic, unusual, and exotic art they can find among the young painters. The ceiling was hung with many mobiles—some good and some bad, but I wish they had hung them a little higher. I dearly love mobiles in their place, but I don't like the feeling that, at any moment, they might get in my hair—which is exactly just what they did.

Then on to the Emporium to see the display of handicraft from India. This is the first time such work has been available in any quantity in the United States. It is usually only in India that one can find such treasures. This exhibit was sent over in an effort to acquaint us with India's culture and to enlarge the market for Indian made goods.

The display was fabulous and the price range suited to anyone's purse. There was hand-wrought silver jewelry and brass ware, hand-made leather and woven slippers. The hand-woven fabrics and velvet evening purses and belts embroidered with real gold and silver that will never tarnish attracted me most. The designs on the purses were all-over geometric patterns of the greatest delicacy and artistry. How I longed for one!

The hand-woven saris and dress lengths of pure silk woven with intricate designs of gold and silver

thread were the loveliest I had ever seen. What a divine evening dress they would make! Seeing them made my scissors finger fairly titch.

The afternoon before saw the Souja Henle Ice Review which surpassed anything I had ever seen. The costumes, choreography and staging were so lovely they took your breath away.

I came back home with stars in my eyes and filled with inspiration, but, nevertheless, glad to be home where living is simple but sweet.

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
