13 Find Scoring Column

Coach Alford O'Connell used everyone but the man who sweeps the spacious Oregon Tech basketball pavilion last night but all it did was hold the OTT point total to one point under the century mark as the Owls rolled out their cage machine for a 99-22 debut score over the Lassen Junior college Cougars of Susanville, Calif.

Lassen is on a contract to stay over another day for the second game of the series tonight at 8. The 6:30 preliminary puts Art Kirkland's Oregon Tech Jayvees against Payless Drugs, the city league team the Owls squeaked by last night, 48-46.

14 PLAY
O'Connell rushed 14 players onto the floor. Thirteen of them found the score column with John Koch, at least temporarily, the reserve center, high with 16 points on eight field goals.

The first team — although there was little talent difference between the regulars and the second five — played less than two quarters, rolling up a 33-11 lead at the quarter with Homer Duncan leading the way with 10 points. The big forward added two early in the third quarter for 12 points and runner-up honors to Koch.

SPED
The capacity crowd made noises like the score was 99-11 in an attempt to cheer the Owls over the 100 mark.

Six of the Owls—Duncan, Don Sutphin, Mary Hamman, the first team and Koch, Tom Humphrey and Jim Peterson of the reserves — scored more than Lassen's top scorer, forward Thor Rhodes with seven points. Two of the Oregon Tech boys, Jack Pinkley and Al Foreman, equalled Rhodes' mark.

NO LISTENERS
O'Connell, who has been working the crying towel overtime, won't get any willing listeners from the gang that saw last night's game. The majority of them believe they were watching the future Oregon College conference champions.

One thing sticks out—O'Connell has virtually the same first team that finished second in the OGC 1st year, but the difference is in the bench where there's a host of kids who just love to pump that net.

Huskies Lose; Ducks Nip Portland Pilots

Two out of three Northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball teams won non-conference competition last night.

The Pacific Coast champion University of Washington Huskies, favorites to sweep the Northern division again, traveled over to Salt Lake City and lost the first of a two-game series to Utah, 62-61.

But the University of Oregon Ducks and Idaho Vandals won, albeit the Ducks had to go into overtime to vanquish the Portland University Pilots. Oregon beat Portland, 65-61.

IDaho WINS
Idaho clamped the brakes of the speedy independent Seattle University Chieftains, taking a 74-71 affair at Moscow. It was Seattle U's first loss in four games. Seattle had averaged 91 points per game before tangleing with the Vandals.

Utah bobbed from a minute to 61-60 deficit with behind to go on Glen Smith's basket. Then the Utes put on a successful stall, waving off three foul shots as the frantic Huskies battled for the ball.

21 POINTS
Bob Houbregas, the big Washington center, led the scorers with 21 points. Smith had 18 to pace the team.

The Portland Pilots led until the final four minutes when a basket by Oregon guard Ken Hunt knotted things at 36-36. They hit the overtime period tied at 38-38 after Portland guard Ken Strode and Oregon center Chet Noe traded field shots.

Quick baskets by Bob Hawes, Bob Peterson and Hunt in the first two minutes of overtime sent the Ducks in front safely. Peterson topped Oregon scorers with 20 points. Lloyd Bergman's 14 led for Portland.

The Idaho-Seattle affair was nip-and-tuck most of the way. The Vandals led, 31-29 at the half, but faded behind to 51-49 at the end of three quarters.

PORTLAND, (AP)—Grant high school, sparked by Johnny Keller whose passing arm produced two third quarter touchdowns, came from behind last night to defeat Astoria 29-14 and earn a berth in the state high school Class A finals.

Grants Pass and MacLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater will play at Pendleton today to determine the other finalist.

The winner of that game will play Grant in Portland next Saturday for the title.

Championships in the Class B and six-man division will be determined today. Gervais from Marion county will meet Walla Walla at La Grande in the Class B finale. Jacksonville will meet Coburg in the six-man championship game at Coburg.

LEAD AT HALF
A crowd of 4493 saw Astoria gain a 14-7 halftime lead over defending champion Grant high school last night in a game played in a rain and wind storm.

The Astorians scored early in the first quarter on Dick Pavlat's 41-yard touchdown run. He kicked the extra point.

Grant evened things up when Dick Remberg ran 72 yards to score and Keller made the extra point with a right end conversion run.

Astoria went into the lead again in the second quarter on an 11-yard pass from Jerry Gustafson to Ron Brown in the Grant end zone. Pavlat kicked his second conversion.

In the third quarter Keller's two passes put Grant back in the game. He pitched one to Don Smith who ran from the 25-yard line for the first score of the quarter. Keller then pitched 33 yards to Jerry Exley who ran the rest of the way. The two tallies gave Grant a 20-14 lead going into the final period.

Bob Zoelch scored the final Grant tally as the game went to a one-yard line plunge in the fourth.

Ty Drops Out In National

SEATTLE. (AP)—Thirty retrievers remained in the wind and rain-staged national championships after a gruelling opening day test here yesterday.

Thirty-nine dogs — Labrador retrievers, Chesapeake and golden retrievers — worked out on the soggy field at Carnation, 35 miles northeast of Seattle. The judges said the conditions were ideal because dogs should be prepared for the steady downpour which hit the region accompanied by 35 to 50 mile winds.

Nine of the dogs fell by the wayside in late afternoon second series trials, a three-bird water test.

Among the victims of the test were the 1949 champion, Marvaded Black Gum, and double champion Matchmaker For Deer Creek. Both dogs are owned and handled by Paul Bakewell III of St. Louis.

Others included Dolobran's Little Ash, owned by C. A. Griscom of Bador, Pa. Oakcreek's Sir Dorchester, owned by James E. Stilwell, Klamath Falls, Ore. Deerwood Trigger, owned by W. D. Hoard, Jr., Fort Atkinson, Wis.; Bigstone Bandit, owned by Edgar P. Lawehr, Holland, Mich.; and Negard's King, Tut, owned by M. J. Kennels, Davenport Iowa.
