

George Is a 'Doll' at Home So Zsa Zsa Wants Him Back

 The best Zsa Zsa could do for me was:
 "I think he'll be back. I'll be the happiest wife in the world if he does. He loves me and I love him."
 Then she added: "But maybe all this publicity is good for his career. We'll build him up again as a big woman hater, although at home he's a doll."
 Zsa Zsa was referring to their marriage, which blew a fuse when she refused to say lines on the Talulah Bankhead radio show which she thought might ridicule their domestic life.
 George got mad because she couldn't take a joke and then she took to pack up and leave their home, which he promptly did with the announcement: "I have been discarded like a squeezed lemon!"
 But now she wants him back and is beaming: "He packed three photographs of me with his clothes."
 Now that she's a Venus, Zsa Zsa's aimed her sights at movie stardom. She's playing a co-lal-lah French model named Zsa Zsa in MGM's "Lofely to Look At" and speaks only French with English subtitles.
 I asked her if she thought her personality would come across to the popcorn munchers even though they couldn't understand French.
 "Dolling," she said, "just ask the cutters on the picture. I could tell you but I can't be THAT connected."

'Hillbilly' GI Believed Fake

SUBBURY, Ont., (AP)—Provincial police insisted today the "shoeless hillbilly" who claimed to have wandered out of the New Mexico wilds to join the U.S. army is really Grainger the Ranger.
 The police said they are sure the Peter Grainger who bewitched American army men with a tale of how he never saw but one woman before he "buried paw" and decided to join up is, in fact, Peter Ernest John Grainger, 25, a self-assured, well-educated forest ranger from Northern Ontario. The U.S. army lists "hillbilly" Grainger as AWOL.
 Far from being the unschooled, innocent child of the wilds he claimed to be, said the provincial police, Grainger is a London-born former officer in the British army who turned up in Canada in December, 1950.
 CAPTIVATING
 When army recruiters in San Antonio, Tex., heard from Grainger November 3 that he never saw an automobile, that he was reared on goat's milk and had never seen an honest-to-goodness town, the army men were captivated.
 Grainger was interviewed, housed, taken riding in automobile and shown San Antonio's night life.
 Then, he was sent to the army proving ground at Aberdeen, Md. on November 12. He disappeared.
 Grainger was found Wednesday walking along the highway between Subbury and Sault Ste. Marie. A tourist camp operator called police because the man's behavior was strange. Police said he was incoherent.
 Friends and police identified him as the Texas Grainger from newspaper photographs of the missing U.S. recruit. Both men had a missing index finger on the left hand.
 TREATMENT
 A psychiatrist recommended sending him to a hospital for treatment of a head injury reportedly suffered in world war two.
 Forestry officials said Grainger joined their force here in August, telling them he was born in Lon-

don, England, had served with the British army in world war two in North Africa and Europe and came to Canada in December, 1950.
 He left his job October 9 for a medical examination at North Bay and did not report again for work.
 U.S. army authorities at Aberdeen said Grainger still is listed as AWOL. Canadian authorities said, however, they had no word from the U.S. regarding the case.

George Hahner Dies At 75

LAKEVIEW—George Hahner, retired rancher and baker, died at Ashland Wednesday evening at the age of 75 years. He was born May 19, 1876 at Bamberg, Germany.
 Mr. Hahner had moved to Ashland to make his home last June. Early this week he became ill and relatives were called to Ashland. Victor G. Hahner, of Lakeview, a son, said that he and Mrs. Hahner returned to their home here Wednesday evening and a short time later news of the death was phoned from Ashland.
 Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday, December 1, from the Presbyterian church. Interment will be at Sunset Park cemetery.
 Mr. Hahner came to the United States when he was 17 years of age, about 1893, and for a number of years he operated a bakery in Chicago. In the spring of 1909, he moved his family to Lake county, where he owned and operated the Gap Ranch, at the mouth of Antelope Canyon, until 1922 when he opened a bakery in Lakeview. In 1934, he retired, selling the bakery to his son, Victor Hahner.
 On May 27, 1901, Mrs. Hahner was married at Chicago to Bertha Roehl, who survives. Also surviving are two sons, Walter Hahner, of Medford; and Victor Hahner, of Lakeview; one daughter, Mrs. E. G. Everett, of Ashland; a sister, who resides in Germany; and five grandchildren.
 Last May, shortly before moving to Ashland, Mr. and Mrs. Hahner celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Crown Zellerbach Earnings Gain

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—The net income of Crown Zellerbach Corp. for the six months ended October 31 was \$11,797,294—an increase of \$793,009 over a similar 1950 period, company officials reported yesterday.
 That equals \$3.82 a share for this period compared with \$3.53 for the 1950 period.
 Federal and Canadian taxes were \$18,669,031 or \$6.42 a share. In the 1950 period these taxes totaled \$10,936,164 or \$3.76 a share.
 Net sales for the first half of the company's fiscal year were \$123,681,118—an increase of \$18,092,102 from the like 1950 period.
 A record high of 476,548 tons of paper and pulp were produced in the six month period, the report said.

Trees Seeded By Helicopter

LAKEVIEW—Grass and tree seeding on the Fremont National forest took to the air this week as a helicopter took on the job of seeding range grass on the burned areas of last summer's three large fires, plus seeding ponderosa pine on about 1000 acres of the Camp Creek burn.
 John E. McDonald, Fremont supervisor, announced that this grass seeding by helicopter will bring to about 6000 acres the total seeding done on the Fremont this fall, and to about 14,500 acres the amount of range seeding done on the Fremont within the past few years.
 The seeding from the air was being done this week under contract to Rick's Helicopters, Inc., of Los Angeles. The copter arrived here Sunday, using the Lakeview airport as its base.
 The copter was seeding to grass the 2236 acres of the camp Creek burn on the national forest (this burn totaled 3395 acres, but the remainder is on private land), the 247 acres of the Willow Creek burn, all on national forest land, and 340 acres of the remaining 73 acres of this burn is on private land.

 Buell is manager of the Lakeview branch, First National Bank of Portland.
 Judge Heckman made the appointments following a meeting at Hotel Lakeview on Tuesday, November 20, with Bob Sandstrom, coordinator of administration, and George Emigh, aid and welfare field representative both from the Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, Salem.
 Other appointments made by Judge Heckman: Fire Chief Bill Arzner, chairman of the fire department; Sheriff Tommy Elliott, chairman of the police department; Dr. W. J. Striely, chairman of the medical department; Mrs. Edna Olson, county welfare administrator, chairman of the aid and welfare department; Glenn E. Tyler, chairman of the engineering and rescue department; Don Peters of the communications department.
