Two elections in Klamath's two rural fire protection districts have been set for Monday. Stewart Lenox fire district plans to elect one member to the board of directors for a five year term. The Suburban fire district election has but one name on its ballot for a director—Geoff Prather. Write in candidates will be accepted at the poll at the fire station. Both polling places will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Turkey Gets Russ Warning

LONDON, (AP)—Moscow radio broadcast today a new Russian note warning Turkey that joining the North Atlantic treaty organization "will undoubtedly cause serious harm to relations between Turkey and the Soviet Union." Turkey must take all the responsibility for the consequences if she persists in joining NATO, said the note, which Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed to the Turkish ambassador in Moscow yesterday. It was the second in a month accusing Turkey of an "aggressive" policy in siding with the United States and 11 European nations which have signed the Atlantic defense pact. Both Turkey and Greece have been invited to join the pact but still are awaiting final approval of full membership. Both yesterday's note and one sent on Nov. 3 said Russia was concerned over Turkey's intention "to join the aggressive Atlantic bloc and . . . the work, carried through under the guidance and with the assistance of United States specialists, for the construction of air and naval bases on Turkish territory."

Jap Police Hold Field Maneuvers

TOKYO, (AP)—The Japanese national rural police force today started its first large scale maneuvers. Two full battalions tackled military problems at Somaqahara, about 150 miles north of here. The Japanese news agency Kyodo said 400 former field grade officers of the Japanese army and navy watched as the battalions advanced under live bazooka fire and engineers preceded the attack, blowing up pillboxes. The 400 officer observers will graduate from the rural police training school after the two-day exercises and become members of the 75,000 man force which was set up 14 months ago to fill the gap left by the absence of a Japanese army.

Green Glasses Cause Of Fine

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Because David A. Finley looked at the world through green colored glasses he was fined \$25 today. Even red traffic lights appeared green to him, Finley testified yesterday in answer to his third citation for driving through a stop sign. "Let me take a look through those specs of yours," said Municipal Judge Roger A. Pfaff. Then, gazing at Finley the judge exclaimed: "Why, you look as green as an artichoke!" He turned to the bailiff and the court clerk. "Why, everybody looks green, even that necktie I noticed was red just awhile ago." "I strongly advise you, Mr. Finley, to change glasses." Finley, shelling out the fine, agreed it might be a good idea.

Formosa Reds Said Surrendering

TAIPEH, Formosa, (AP)—The Chinese Nationalist defense ministry reported today that 576 Communists surrendered during a 70-day amnesty period which ended at midnight Friday. Reds who gave themselves up during the period were guaranteed immunity from arrest and assured means of earning a living. Security officials said an intensive drive would be carried out now to weed out Communist elements in Formosa.

Heavy Fine For Gay Guy

NEW YORK, (AP)—Stanley Goldman's idea of putting Florida license plates on his car to beat New York traffic laws backfired to the tune of a license revocation, a \$1000 fine and 60 days in jail. The 25-year-old Goldman said he got his Florida plates in the name of a business associate, Stanley Lambert, of 6761 South Pacific street, Miami. Goldman accumulated 46 New York traffic tickets in less than a year. But he never bothered to pay one, believing that nobody would worry much about a violator who had gone back to Florida. Yesterday, Goldman was arrested for double parking. Police had been getting quite familiar with the Florida license number, and Goldman was haled before Chief Magistrate John M. Murtagh. Murtagh handed Goldman the triple penalty, the stiffest sentence of its kind ever imposed here. Goldman wept but the magistrate grimly told him, "you deserve no sympathy."

Thanks Go To Hunter Who Saved Injured Man's Life

By MALCOLM EPLEY Perhaps because 43-year-old Alex Brown has a hobby of hunting Mart Jones is alive today. Jones, who operates the Dorris theater, was severely injured in an accident near Tennant, Calif., late in September. When a pickup overturned as he and two companions were heading into the woods to set up deer camp for the next day's opening season, Jones' head was pinned between the top of the cab and the door. The two companions futilely attempted to lift the truck off its side to free Jones. Just then big Alex Brown happened along . . . a 207-pound moulder and welder from Sacramento. He found Les Chase and C. F. Enlow desperately trying to save Jones with little luck. Brown quickly chained the wrecked truck to his own pickup, and then lifted the dead weight high enough to allow Chase and Enlow to pull Jones free. Brown had Jones placed on a camp cot in the back of his truck, covered him, and rushed him on in to Tennant to a first aid station. The big Negro said he learned first aid while serving as a seaman with the merchant marine. Jones was brought from Tennant to Klamath Valley hospital. Three physicians worked on him, a case they considered almost hopeless. They found the injured man terribly cut up; he had compound fractures of the skull, extreme injuries to the eyes, a broken nose and a fractured jaw. His life teetered for several days, but finally the crisis passed and Jones is now improving. Recently Brown came back to Klamath Falls from his Sacramento home. He visited the Jones family, talked with Mart. And the big man, today is back at his job building wheels for freight cars in Sacramento's general shops, will long be remembered by Mart Jones and his family. To them he is a man to whom they will probably never repay their debt . . . a life.
