 A Sprague River farmer, 23-year-old Clarence L. Hamilton, was trapped in mud beneath a tractor about eight hours before rescued and brought to Klamath Valley hospital yesterday.  
 Hamilton said he was "ditching" on the McAnulty farm at Sprague River Sunday morning when the rig overturned pinning him in deep mud. He said cleats of the tractor caught him across the stomach and pinned him to the ground.  
 Hamilton estimated he lay trapped about four hours before an unidentified ditch-rider found him, and it took another four hours to release him.  
 Verna Lee of Sprague River brought Hamilton to the hospital. His condition is said good today.

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**U.S. Airbases Ready To Go**  
 CASABLANCA, Morocco, (AP)—The first of five giant U.S. airbases being built on the African continent went into operation this weekend with the arrival of six B-36 bombers on a 5000-mile nonstop flight from Texas.  
 The bombers, part of the strategic air command, flew from Carswell air base at Fort Worth to Sidi Slimane, a bomber base built in the desert of French Morocco about 50 miles northeast of here.  
 They are to engage in a training mission, and are to be followed by other flights of strategic air command bombers on a rotation basis.  
 Maj. Gen. Archie Old Jr., commander of the fifth air division stationed in Morocco, welcomed the B-36 flight, which was commanded by Col. Thomas Gerrity.  
 Sidi Slimane is the first of the five bases to become operational, although another air base at Nouasser, 15 miles south of here, also has runways completed.  
 The program in Morocco includes five bases and a headquarters for the fifth air division at Rabat, capital of the French protectorate.  
 The bombers assigned here, on temporary training missions are to remain about 90 days.

 Other speakers were State Rep. Paul E. Geddes, Roseburg, president of the Oregon state bar, and Mrs. Carol Arth, Redlands, Calif., a young GOP executive.  
 Geddes said there would have to be an end to the "something for nothing" philosophy if the nation is to survive.  
 Sen. Wayne Morse will address tonight's banquet.

**Chaper Clothing Object Of OPS**  
 WASHINGTON, (AP)—In an effort to maintain an ample supply of low-priced clothing, the government is preparing to give makers a slightly higher profit.  
 Morris Chandross, chief of the office of price stabilization apparel branch, told newsmen yesterday that meetings are now being held with industry committees to work out details.  
 He said orders designed to encourage manufacturers to continue making lower-priced clothing will be issued in March. He said that will be ample time to cover next fall's lines of clothing, normally shown and sold to retailers in late spring.

## U.N. Negotiators Fire 21 Questions At Stubborn Reds As Peace Talks Jell

MUNSAN, Korea, (AP)—The 21 questions the United Nations command asked the Communists at today's military armistice negotiations in Panmunjom:  
 1. Does your principle No. 6 (proposed ban on increase of troops and arms during a truce) preclude the return to Korea of individuals sent elsewhere for short periods of rest or temporary duty?  
 2. Does your No. 6 preclude furnishing a replacement for a soldier evacuated because of illness, injury or expiration of term of service?  
 3. Does your No. 6 prevent replacing, say, a company with a company of similar size and type?  
 4. Do you intend by this principle to prohibit rotation and replenishment for U.N. forces?  
 5. Does your No. 6 preclude the return to Korean ports of naval vessels sent elsewhere for periodic rest or temporary duty?  
 6. It is assumed that your proposals are intended to apply during an armistice. Is this correct?  
 7. You make no mention of military installations. Do you intend your principle No. 6 to permit unlimited construction and rehabilitation of airfields?  
 8. What do you mean by the term "weapons"? Do you include airplanes under the category of "weapons"?  
 9. Is it intended to prevent replenishment of ammunition used in training?  
 10. Do you intend to prevent exchange of weapons of the same type?  
 11. What is your definition of "military forces"? What forces do you include in that term?  
 12. Should the nations forming the supervisory organ to conduct the inspections have representatives on both your side and on our side? (Red principle No. 7 proposed limited behind-the-lines inspection during an armistice.)  
 13. How many nations do you have in mind on the supervisory organ, one nation or a group of nations?  
 14. What nations do you have in mind?  
 15. Is it your intention that both sides invite the same neutral nations or different neutral nations to inspect our respective sides?  
 16. Is it your thought to station observation teams from neutral nations at the ports of entry, or to send them there from time to time at the discretion of the armistice commission?  
 17. We would like to have a list of the nations whose representatives you would consider acceptable to you.  
 18. Is your seventh principle intended to prevent observation of facilities other than ports of entry?  
 19. Do you intend the inspection you proposed in No. 7 to be limited solely to the specific items you list in principle No. 6?  
 20. What body or group will make inspections of the demilitarized zone?  
 21. In "necessary inspections beyond the demilitarized zone" do you include aerial reconnaissance and photographic reconnaissance?

## Police Probe Miami Blasts

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Authorities moved swiftly today to halt a wave of dynamite blasts that have rocked Miami in recent months.  
 A Jewish center and the Carver Village Negro housing units were among targets of three explosions Sunday morning. No one was injured but 44 memorial windows were shattered at the Miami Hebrew school and congregation where damage was estimated at \$400.  
 Assistant Police Chief J. A. Youell promised a group of protesting rabbis that increased police protection would be provided for synagogues.  
 Mayor Chelsie J. Senerchia cut short his vacation in Nassau to return to Miami today.  
 The FBI was asked to investigate the incidents.  
 Youell promised that security patrols would be established to check all synagogues in Miami at least every 15 to 20 minutes.  
 Mrs. Senerchia revealed that she had received two threatening telephone calls in the past week "saying we didn't get the Negroes out of Carver Village within a month they would bomb it to pieces."  
 Police Chief Walter E. Headley said he thought the Negro and related. He attributed the dynamite of the synagogue and school Jewish center bombings were un- "some crank."  
 "The Carver blasts were well planned," Headley said. "This one planned." Headley said. "This one wasn't. Somebody just tossed a stick of dynamite out of a car. I don't think there is any connection between the two."  
 The anti-defamation league of B'nai B'rith offered \$1000 reward for information leading to the arrest and convictions of the deplorable culprits.  
 Yesterday's dynamiting at Carver Village was the third in that area. The first was set off Sept. 15 and the second one last Friday. The latter caused \$22,000 damage.
