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Atom Stocks Said Double

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—This country's knowledge of atomic weapons has almost doubled in the past year, says Dr. Alvin C. Graves, and so has its stockpile.

Dr. Graves, scientific director of atomic energy commission tests, said in an interview.

"Our knowledge of atomic weapons has been increased in the past year at a much greater rate than in any similar period. Our advance almost equals all previous development since the first nuclear detonation at Alamogordo, N.M., in 1945."

He also indicated the stockpile of A-weapons has increased in about the same proportion.

Dr. Graves, who directed the recent series of atomic blasts at the AEC proving ground near here, said "It is reasonable to assume that we have more weapons similar to the ones tested here. We wouldn't be shooting off the only models we have."

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Pilot's Wife Holds Hope

GLEN FALLS, N.Y. (AP)—Mrs. John J. Swift said today she would "like very much to believe" a Hungarian government report that her husband, a U.S. air force flier missing since November 19, is in that country.

At Budapest today, the Hungarian government said the missing American plane and its four crewmen were in the iron curtain's country.

Earlier, a Tass report broadcast by the Moscow radio said the C47 transport had been forced down by Soviet fighters in Papa, in western Hungary.

Mrs. Swift, 30, told a reporter she said she had been "grasping at every straw," and hoped that "this might be the right one."

Mrs. Swift said she had received a letter from her husband, second pilot on the transport, on the day the plane was reported missing.
