Carelessness Causes Fires

PORTLAND, (AP)—Ninety percent of Oregon's 954 forest fires this year were man-caused.

That was the report Saturday of a committee to the Western Forestry and Conservation Assoc. convention.

The committee report cited what it said was a lack of trained personnel within the forest industry to fight fires, urged additional funds for fire fighting and asked tightening up of closures.

Oregon should be divided into closure zones and operators should be advised of what zones their operations are in, the report said. Higher bonds cover liability for fires and a law making it mandatory for all operators to have fire tools at hand after April 1 each year also were proposed.

The committee suggested that the opening of fire closure season be advanced from May 15 to April 15. Fire safety recommendations included:

Prohibition of the use of fuse or hand caps and the use of explosives during closed season.

Collaboration between saw manufacturers and the Oregon forest products laboratory to develop a saw which is safe against fires.

The committee recommended that the state legislature give the Oregon forestry department more funds to hire additional personnel.

STAMP ASKED
SEATTLE, (AP)—State sponsors will ask the postoffice department to issue a special Columbia Basin stamp. It would commemorate the basin water celebration, next May 22-June 1. A resolution for it was approved at a weekend meeting here of members of the Columbia basin commission, Washington state highway commission and the celebration committee. The group also approved plans for the celebration of the first water on the vast reclamation project.

Tax Probers Still At It

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A justice department attorney testified Monday that Rep. Boykin (D-Ala.) and T. Lamar Caudle told him that he considered a "highly improper" interest in his prosecution of an Alabama tax fraud case.

In addition, 80 prints have been constantly circulating in schools and clubs of the nation since the film was completed.

The picture was shown in Chile last month as an assistant attorney general.

Chairman King (D-Calif.) announced he will invite Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark and Attorney General J. Edgar Hoover to testify before his subcommittee on the "outside activities" which led to dismissal of Caudle last month as an assistant attorney general.

King said Clark would be given an opportunity to "clear the record of his participation" in trips to South Carolina resort spots with Caudle in the private plane of Troy Whitehead, Charlotte, N. C., businessman who, it developed later, was having tax trouble.

As for McGrath, the subcommittee wants his comment on Caudle's testimony that McGrath approved Caudle's accepting a \$5000 fee from the sale of an airplane.

The buyer was an investor for New York later convicted of tax fraud.

Huks Kidnap 14 Persons

MANILA, (AP)—Communist-led Hukbong forces kidnapped 14 and burned the city halls in raids on three towns north of Manila Sunday night and early Monday.

The raids were at Santa Rita, Hermosa and Infanta.

Reports reaching here said the Hukbong probably would have kidnapped many more persons, but that TNT stored in the city hall at Santa Rita exploded at the height of the raid. More than 200 citizens held captive in the town square escaped in the panic which followed the blast.

The raiders reportedly occupied Santa Rita for more than two hours. There was some shooting when the band of 250 men swept into the town, but no serious resistance was offered.

Army troops which arrived hours later found no trace of the Hukbong or their captives.

Few details of the raids on Hermosa and Infanta were available. Dispatches to the Manila Times said four persons were killed and five more wounded in Hermosa and two were wounded in Infanta.

Seven persons were abducted from Infanta, two from Hermosa and five from Santa Rita.

Governor's Son Fined For Speeding

MONTGOMERY, Ala., (AP)—The son of Gov. Gordon Persons was fined \$14 for speeding here and Alabama's chief executive says he's glad it happened.

"This ought to show that I mean business on speeding violations," Persons commented after Gordon, Jr., was picked up by the highway patrol yesterday for speeding inside Montgomery city limits.

Persons added that the fine will come out of his son's allowance.

The governor recently set speed limits on all U.S. highways in the state in a move to reduce Alabama's traffic accident and death toll.

LIFETIME AVERAGE
PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Little Richie Ashburn, dynamic outfielder for the Philadelphia Phillies, made the biggest increase in lifetime batting average this year. At the start of the season, Richie had a lifetime mark of .304. This year he belted the ball at a .344 clip and thereby raised his average 11 points to .315.

Chieftain Of Vietnam Out

SAIGON, Indochina, (AP)—Communist rebel leader Ho Chi Minh was reported to have been removed from his command over Indochina's Red Vietnamese jungle forces and replaced by Truong Chinh—a man more loyal to Moscow.

The principal charges against Ho, according to intelligence reports and other well-informed sources, seems to be that he has gone the way of Yugoslavia's Premier Marshal Tito and others who place the interests of their own country over those of the Kremlin.

Ho has been reported purged, or killed before. But none of these reports has been confirmed. No westerner has seen the Moscow-trained guerrilla leader for five years.

The official radio of the Vietnamese underground government, which has been fighting a losing battle against the French, still refers to Ho as president—a relatively figurehead position. But Truong Chinh was said to have assumed the leading role as head of the Vietnamese supreme committee, a kind of political body known as the Tong Bo.

The reported purge—now a familiar thing among Communist parties that show signs of straying from unquestioning obedience to Moscow—may well stem from the series of defeats suffered by the Vietnamese in its five-year struggle to gain control of this French-ruled country on Red China's southern borders.

School Diets Shorten Life?

NEW YORK, (AP)—The scientific journal Nutrition Reviews raises the surprising question whether the high calorie diets of American school children may shorten their lives.

The review says the only experiments ever made on calories and length of life raise this question, even though they were done on rats.

The experiments were by Dr. C. M. McKay, of Cornell university, and they have been confirmed many times in the last 20 years. But nothing further has been done.

"The calorie restrictions during the growth period of rats," the review says, "Results in notable decrease in the life span of this animal and probably represents the most significant contribution so far made in the field of nutrition and aging."

"To what extent, if any, the rat observations apply to humans remains uncertain, but they raise the question whether current emphasis on high caloric intake by school children is well advised."

The review proposes human studies on persons whom the world was forced to live during youth on calories considered insufficient by present American standards. Watch ing these people now in adult life would give some answers. The review suggests that the world health organization of the United Nations organize this calorie study.
