

MINORS SQUASH RECALL

Reversal Expected By Majors

COLUMBUS, O. (U)—Although the minor leagues voted overwhelmingly to wipe out baseball's 21-hour recall rule, the statute will remain on the books, an informal poll of the big league clubs indicated today.

The rule, which Pres. Frank Robinson of the International League described as "even a bigger threat to the structure of the minors than nationwide broadcasting and televising of major league games," has long been a sore point with the little fellows. Their constant cry has been that the rule robs them of their stars and kills off the attendance.

The rule allows the majors to recall their optioned players by giving only one day's notice. In this way, the parent clubs can shuffle their players back and forth at will.

TOSSED OUT
By a 41 to seven count, the minor leagues voted to toss the rule out the window. This means that a player, once sent down, must remain for the entire minor league season including playoffs.

The majors, however, also must pass this amendment in order to kill the rule.

This, however, does not seem likely unless there is a change of heart between now and next Monday when the vote comes up.

A poll of a majority of the big league clubs showed that at least five clubs in the National—Brooklyn, New York, St. Louis, Philadelphia and Boston—and four clubs in the American—New York, Detroit, Boston and Philadelphia—will vote against the amendment. That leaves only three in the National and four in the American who are likely to back the minors, far short of the needed majority.

OPEN
The minors, however, won an important point when they voted unanimously to set up a new "open" classification. This was interpreted as a tremendous victory for the Pacific Coast league which has been clamoring for higher status for years.

Naturally, coast leaguers were jubilant over their victory for special recognition. With the approval of the majors, which was expected, they expect to apply "right away" for the "open" rank, one step higher than Triple A. At the present time there are three Triple A leagues—the International, American and PCL.

FIRST DRAFT
The "open" class would permit the PCL to have first draft rights over lower classification leagues. Under its own draft (set from \$15,000 to \$15,000), enable its players to stay an extra year (four to five) and give its players the right of appeal to be drafted by the PCL. In the present, the PCL is the only minor league to meet all the requirements. To move up from Triple A to "open" classification, a league must have an aggregate population of 10,000,000, a total park capacity of 120,000, no salary limit and an average attendance of 25,000 over the past five years.

Nine Ink For Basin Cage Play

Nine teams aired intentions of entering the Klamath Basin basketball league last night, and six more may come in before next Tuesday's meeting in the city hall.

The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, 7:30 p.m. At that time, Pres. Harold Hendrickson hopes to draw up a schedule. Entry fees of \$25 per team should be in at the meeting, the deadline for entry in the far-flung cage circuit.

Teams in now are Klamath Falls, Beatty Lakers, Chiloquin, Dorris Jayhawks, Keno, Malheur, Merrill VFW and the Tulake Inn.

Those who may get in are Bly, Sorage River, Beatty, Townsies, Tulake, Mormons, Henley and League Valley.

The league hopes to tip off shortly after the first of the year on a Monday and Thursday schedule.

Managers or sponsors wanting to enter the league are asked to notify Hendrickson by meeting time.

Those present last night okaved a Basin league playoff among the top four teams but obtained an answer on the Basin-City playoff, an annual feature.

NEW YORK, (U)—Heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott, former athletic commissioner chairman Eddie Egan, and 21-year old Gil Turner, a sensational boxing newcomer, today were chosen for the boxing writers association's three main awards of 1951.

Walcott, who won his title by knocking out Ezzard Charles in an amazing upset last July, was voted the Edward J. Neil Memorial Plaque for having done the most for boxing during the year. The plaque is named in honor of Ned, Associated Press sports writer who was killed in 1937 while serving as a war correspondent in Spain.

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TAYLOR COACH OF THE YEAR

NEW YORK, (U)—Charles (Chuck) Taylor, first year coach at Stanford, today was named the Football Coach of the Year in a ballot tabulated by The New York World-Telegram & Sun and other Scripps-Howard newspapers.

Taylor, who guided his team into the Rose Bowl in his first year as head coach, succeeds Charles

Caldwell of Princeton. The 31-year-old tutor will receive a huge plaque at a dinner Jan. 10 at Cincinnati during the football coaches' association convention.

Of the 422 votes cast, Taylor received 192. That gave him a lead of 18 over Gen. Robert Neyland, Tennessee coach, and 39 over Clair

George Washington, who became first president of the USA, won the bare knuckles championship of the Colony of Virginia, in 1748. He had to meet only a few foemen, since fist fights then were few and brutish hardly known... why George, you didn't tell us!

Probably the greatest weight reducer of all time, in boxing, was Johnny Dundee. He engaged in about 307 bouts, and had to take off a about 100 pounds for each. He boxed as a feather, bantam, light weight, and later, as a welterweight. In 1923, while Eugene Crique held the bantam (126 lb.) crown, he was matched to meet Dundee who, at the time, boxed at 176. On fight day, a few months later, Dundee weighed in at under 126 lbs, and took the crown from Crique.
