Mrs. Pierce is the daughter-in-law of former Gov. Walter Pierce, a Democrat, and a sister-in-law of Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. supreme court.

New Church Is Prospect For Mt. Laki District

The Mt. Laki community is rejoicing over the generous offer of the Henry Semon family to contribute toward building a new church, the sanctuary of which will be a memorial to their son and brother, Charles Henry Semon, who lost his life in world war two.

Subscriptions are being received for the funds necessary to match the Semon gift and complete the structure. It is hoped that pledges will insure the beginning of building operations as soon as weather permits in the spring.

The new building will replace the little white church which for years has been a landmark on the Merrill road. This has been outgrown, and the Sunday school and church are using the larger facilities of the adjacent Henley grange hall. Additional space urgently needed will be provided by the new structure. Plans for the building include the memorial sanctuary and ample rooms for Sunday school assembly and classes, kitchen, and all social and religious needs.

FULLTIME PASTOR
The Mt. Laki church has been served by a number of ministers over the years, but had no full-time leader until the coming of Rev. J. R. Delap in 1948. The present pastor, the Rev. Arthur L. Rice, came to Mt. Laki church in November 1950. Chairman of the building committee is Sam Enman, and other members are: W. M. Williams, A. R. Dickson, Henry Semon, Mrs. Wallace Thompson, John Short, Mrs. Orv Campbell, Ralph Hill, Ronald Whittatch, Roy Laprairie and Scott Thompson.

The little church and Sunday school was first organized in November, 1908, when a small group of Christians met at the Spring Lake school house and organized what is still called the Mt. Laki church.

Records show that on August 3, 1909, John and Ida Koonitz deeded to the church, two acres of ground, on the S. W. corner of their homestead, where the present church now stands.

CHARTER MEMBERS
There were 12 charter members, Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Stevenson, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. LaPrairie, Mrs. Sarah Steeman, Florence M. Short, Mr. and Mrs. George D. Grizzle, Mr. Grizzle still living in Klamath Falls, Roy LaPrairie living at Hager, and Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Addison, Mrs. Addison now resides in Eugene, Ore.

On March 11, 1909, a meeting was held at the A. L. LaPrairie home and three trustees were elected, they were John Koonitz, Chas. Steffman, and J. G. Anderson.

Mrs. John Koonitz was head of the Ladies Aid society for many years. This society still functions at Mt. Laki, and meets every month in the different homes.

In 1921 the first pastor was called, Rev. Louis M. Anderson, who was then living at Merrill. Sunday school was held every Sunday and Rev. Anderson preached as often as he could get to Mt. Laki.
