Wheat Sets Record Highs Today

CHICAGO. (AP)—Wheat smashed out new high prices for nearly four years on the Board of Trade today. The rest of the market swirled up with the bread cereal.

More export business and a growing feeling that not much wheat is left to export under the relatively low prices of the international wheat agreement created part of the buying.

December and March wheat sold at \$2.69 a bushel. That was the best price for any wheat delivery since the main contract sold at a high of \$2.90 in February, 1948.

Stocks Manage Slight Gains

NEW YORK. (AP)—After leading the stock market ahead for the greater part of the session, the railroad division faltered today in late trading. Selling out back most of the gains throughout the day and left the market holding in the middle by a slim margin.

Gains and losses spread over a range of a little more than a point higher to around a point lower.

The volume of trading expanded to an estimated 2,000,000 shares as against 1,800,000 shares yesterday. At that rate business was the best in more than a month.

Canadian Pacific was a sterling performer on the upside for the greater portion of the day. It posted an extreme gain of about 2 points before falling back with the rest of the market.

Northern Pacific, which has made some recent spectacular gains, was under heavy pressure. At one time it was up as much as a point, but in the final hour it dropped abruptly for a loss of more than 3 points.

Both of these carriers have heavy oil interests.

The market opened fast and higher.
