Mrs. George A. Wirtz, 529 Jefferson, will be hostess to the club Wednesday, December 19, at 1 o'clock.



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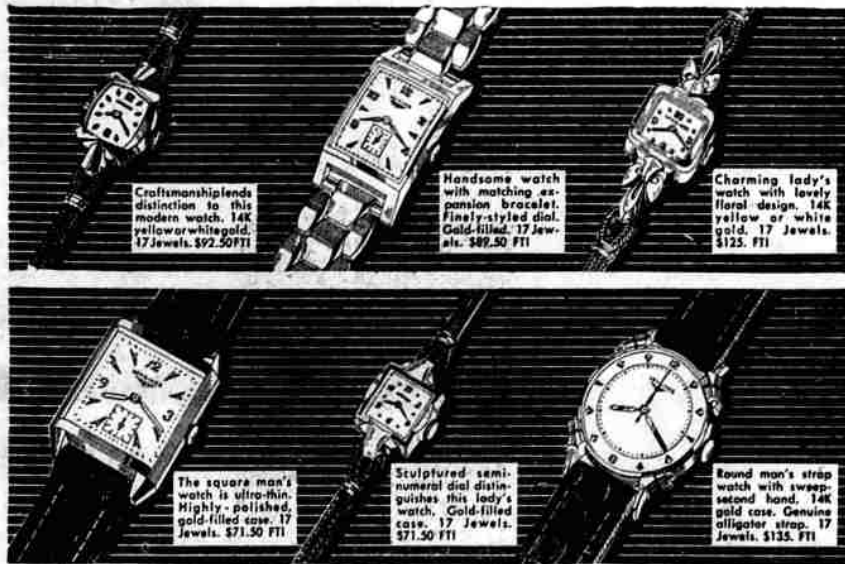
