German Areas To Unite

STUTTGART, Germany, (U.S.—) Three small German states have voted to form one big new state covering the entire southwest corner of Germany.

Voters of the three states approved the merger overwhelmingly in a plebiscite yesterday. The vote was 743,136 to 75,518. The Allied high commission is considered certain to approve the outcome.

United by the voters' verdict are Wuerttemberg-Baden, with 3,957,000 inhabitants; Baden, with 1,372,000; and Wuerttemberg-Hohenzollern, 1,264,000.

The new state with a total population of 6,593,000 stretches from Heidelberg on the north to Wurttemberg on the south and from Ulm west to the French border. It becomes the fourth largest state in all West Germany, which now will have nine states instead of 11.

It will be several months before a new constitution can be drawn and a new parliament elected to put the new state into operation.

The new state has not yet been named, but its capital probably will be Stuttgart.

Sponsors of the merger expect it to produce economic and administrative efficiency by centralizing governmental administration.

It also removes a post-war German complaint against the Allies, who carved the area into three states to fit occupation zone boundaries. Before the war consisted of two states, Wuerttemberg and Baden.

Chief opposition to the merger came from the Badenese, who wanted their historic state restored to its prewar dimensions.

The Communists also fought the merger, contending it would aid "remilitarization and American imperialism."

Doctor Free In Death Case

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (U.S.—) Doctors at a big University hospital here have been instructed to prepare anesthetics personally for their own cases in the wake of the death of a patient given the wrong drug.

But aside from that rule change and transfer of a nurse, there were no other repercussions from the death of a 30-year-old Ernest A. Leskela of Bruce Crossing, in Michigan's upper peninsula.

The attending physician, intending to use the novocaine, mistakenly injected 15 cubic centimeters of adrenalin, Dr. Kerlikowski said. Noting immediate distress, the surgeon made a quick incision and massaged the heart by hand, he said, but the youth died two hours later.

Death was listed as accidental after an investigation.

The nurse involved was transferred from the operating room. Hospital rules forbid administering drugs from unlabeled containers.

Blast Try Falls Flat

MIAMI, Fla. (U.S.—) Police in suburban Coral Gables were without a clue today as to the identity of the person who threw a stick of dynamite at a Jewish center early Sunday morning.

Police Lt. J. Wallace said the dynamite apparently was thrown from a moving automobile shortly after a city policeman had gone off duty at 7 a.m. after an all-night vigil at the center.

The fuse apparently was knocked out before the dynamite landed near the door of the synagogue, Wallace said.

Henry Smith, custodian, found the dynamite when he reported for work at 7:30 a.m. and threw it into the street. Two hours later Maurice Finkhofer, who lives nearby, found it and took it into the synagogue.

A 10-inch fuse was found at the base of a tree about 30 feet from where the dynamite landed, Wallace reported.

It was the first time a dynamite attempt was made in Coral Gables but the Miami area has been stirred by a series of dynamite attacks at Jewish synagogues and at Carver Village, Negro housing project, in recent weeks.

Last Sunday 44 memorial windows in a synagogue in Miami were shattered by a dynamite blast and dynamite exploded but caused no damage at Carver Village the same day. On Nov. 30 a dynamite blast caused \$22,000 damage at Carver Village. No one was injured.

No arrests have been made and police say they have uncovered no clues. Rewards totaling \$8700 have been offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the dynamiters.

Boring Named GOP President

PORTLAND, (U.S.—) E. E. Boring, Salem, is the new president of the state Republican club.

He was elected Saturday at the club's convention here. Sen. James Duff (R-Penn.) was the principal convention speaker.

Duff urged the nomination and election of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower for president. He said Eisenhower "is the one sure guarantee of the people for a change in administration, just as he is the best guarantee in the world for peace of the world by reason of his world-wide standing."

But Duff also warned Republicans against what he said was "trying to turn back the clock." "It is surely time for us to face up to the realities, put ourselves in touch with the thinking of the people, and demands of the people, instead of cramming down their throats something they don't want. That method has not worked in the last five national elections, and don't forget—coming up in 1952 is the last call for dinner"

North Pole Flight Slowed

SEATTLE, (U.S.—) Weather and engine trouble grounded an Alaska Airlines DC-4 early today, delaying the start of a scheduled flight to the North Pole with a real pole and a sack of letters for Santa.

Alaska Airlines officials said, weather permitting, the plane would fly sometime today to Point Barrow, Alaska, departure point on the 2600-mile polar flight. The polar hop is scheduled tomorrow.

The airliner was to have taken off from Fairbanks field north of here last night. When trouble developed in one engine, after an earlier delay due to weather, maintenance men held up the flight to get the four-engine ship in perfect shape for the hazardous 12-hour flight over the frozen Arctic wasteland.

The specially-outfitted plane will carry 5000 letters to Santa collected by "North Pole Nellie" (Mrs. Audrey Vance of Fairbanks, Alaska) from children throughout Alaska and the states. Mrs. Vance will make the trip as stewardess during the flight.

The airliner's cargo also will include Stan Garson's north pole—a red and white striped steel cylinder—but Garson, who originated the idea of planting a real pole at the pole, probably won't make the trip. The airline said civil aeronautics administration rules will permit only employees aboard during the polar flight.

An air force navigator will accompany the flight—the first by a commercial airliner over the North Pole.
