

# Egypt May Break With British

CAIRO, Egypt, (AP)—Egypt's government today considered severing diplomatic relations with Britain following leveling of an Egyptian village by road-building British soldiers.

Acting Foreign Minister Ibrahim Farag Pasha said a decision would be made soon. The cabinet held two lengthy sessions yesterday but a spokesman said only that Anglo-Egyptian relations were discussed.

In the Suez Canal zone the British announced that two of their soldiers were stabbed, beaten and killed and a third was critically wounded in Ismailia's Arab quarter Saturday night.

An Egyptian communique reported another Egyptian dead from wounds received in the fighting at Suez last Tuesday, raising to 51 the number of Egyptians reported killed.

The Egyptian cabinet yesterday also approved a royal decree confiscating the lands of the 78-year-old British-founded Gezira Sporting Club in Cairo, center of much of the capital's social life.

The club's 150-acre establishment includes a race course, polo field and golf course, leased to the government and situated in Cairo's most expensive foreign residential sector.

Informants said that the cabinet also decided yesterday to discontinue all British employment by Egyptian government departments. The order reportedly would affect about 50 teachers, technicians and other experts.

The proposal to sever diplomatic relations resulted "directly" from British forces' aggression in Suez, said the acting foreign minister in referring to the demolition Saturday of an Arab village outside the city.

Heavily guarded British engineers bulldozed down the Arab huts with tanks to make way for a new road and bridge.

Egyptian police had failed to heed government orders to resist the demolition of the new road, linking the British garrison area at Suez with a water plant, bypasses a favorite spot for Egyptian snipers. The British said they completed it under the protection of their troops yesterday, without opposition.

# Former KF Man Passes

Surviving are his widow, Louise, a daughter Catherine and son, Martin, his mother, Mrs. Gertrude Martin, all of Eugene; three brothers, Clarence and Lester Mason, Mills City, Ore., and George Mason, Rickreall, Ore.

Rev. Ernest Hartman, pastor of St. Mary's church, Eugene, will give the burial service. Interment will be in Fairview cemetery, near Mills City.

# Atom Watchdog Now On Market

WEST LYNN, Mass., (AP)—The General Electric company announced today the development of a "watchdog" that sounds an alarm when atomic radiations have made an area dangerous to humans.

GE said the so-called area health monitor would be installed in atomic energy plants, water works, laboratories, hospitals and other places requiring records of gamma or X-ray radiation.

Engineers said the monitor measured and recorded the "ionizing potential" of gamma rays in an area. This potential, they explained, was the important factor in determining the effect the radiation would have on human tissue.

However, the new device was not designed to replace protective devices carried by workers who are active in present, but rather to monitor large areas.

# Philippines Battered As Typhoon Roars Ov'r Land, Volcano Still Erupting

MANILA, (AP)—A raging tropical typhoon ripped through the central Philippines today. It killed 12 persons, left thousands homeless and wrecked millions of dollars worth of crops and buildings.

As the 125-mile-an-hour storm churned into the Bulu sea, AP correspondent Frank A. White reported from Cebu City on Cebu island, that at least 12 persons were dead and hundreds homeless.

White said virtually every building made of light materials was partially wrecked and many large structures lost roofs or sustained other damage. Cebu bore the brunt of the storm.

Radio communications with most of the devastated central islands were disrupted. Authorities feared casualties would be heavy.

showed no sign of cooling off. The typhoon lashed Samar, Leyte and Cebu with terrific winds and rain. Monday night it was south and west of Panay island, which forms the western rim of the Bulu sea.

Winds in the center of the storm reportedly were losing some of their violence.

Two Philippines Air Line pilots who flew over Leyte and Cebu Monday reported extensive damage to airport facilities, planes and crops.

First officer G. Hernandez, who flew to Manila from Cebu Monday, said people there told him many fishermen were killed.

Capt. S. P. Quimbo said at least 30 square miles of coconut plantations on Leyte were destroyed and some smaller houses blown away. He said high tides washed away one-third of the Tacloban airstrip. Winds wrapped a C-47 transport around a tree and smashed three small planes.

Heavy rain accompanying the typhoon winds sent huge landslides of lava roaring down the slopes of Hibok Hibok volcano. Authorities feared towns on the north side of Camiguin island, already covered by a deep blanket of ashes would be buried by slides.
