M'Carthy Airs Union Charges

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—A brief portion of a wire recording, which Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said was made at a New York meeting of left wing labor leaders plotting to wreck the nation's war effort, was played at a meeting last night.

Background noises in the recording kept the audience from hearing clearly and several listeners shouted they could not understand it. But McCarthy identified one of the principal voices as that of Harry Bridges, the left wing leader of the West coast longshoremen's union who has been convicted of perjury and is free on \$25,000 bond.

The recording was played by McCarthy for about two minutes before an audience of 200 University of Wisconsin Young Republicans.

MUNSAN, Korea. (AP)—Communist delegates drove to the Panmunjom truce conference today in chromium trimmed sedans instead of military jeeps. It was a case of keeping up with the Joneses.

Allied delegates switched from jeeps to a green army sedan last month.

The spirited, hot-blooded band of loving movie kings headed by Errol Flynn, Tom Neal and Franchot Tone will just have to do without Bob. He was nominated for honors plus earlier this year by an Italian actress named Lia de Leo, who announced, through a press agent, that Bob had swept her off her little feet.

He's plumb sorry, Bob told me, but he isn't the type.

Not even a bush-league Errol Flynn!

"It's very flattering and all that," Bob grinned. "Why, they 'But I ain't me," he wailed. "I'm reasonably certain of that."

It beats Bob why they're pinning the 1951 version of the "Chicken Inspector" badge on him.

Or why he was linked with everybody but Queen Mary and Beatrice Lillie while he was in London making "Ivanhoe."

"They made me quite a gay blade," Bob sighed. "Why, they even had me in Paris with Joan Fontaine. I hadn't even been to Paris, much less with Fontaine."

JUST QUIET GUY

He was, Bob explained, a pretty quiet guy whom a lot of people don't know and "If I tried to be anything else, I'd make a heck of a mess of it. I've done very few colorful things in my lifetime. I've never been lost in a Mexican jungle and I don't climb mountains."

It's hunky-dory with him if the tongue-waggers insist on thinking that he's a rugged trident tail feather under the Italian skies while the cameras rolled on "Quo Vadis."
