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Bill McColl Named Lineman of Year

Richter, Can'mella Listed

NEW YORK (AP)—Bill McColl, a big factor in Stanford's winning of the Pacific Coast conference football title and the Rose Bowl spot against Illinois, has been elected as the Lineman of the Year.

The 21-year-old 225-pound star from San Diego was the choice of 103 sportswriters and sportscasters participating in the Associated Press poll.

"The greatest lineman I have ever seen," said Coach Chuck Taylor of Stanford.

Big Bill, named on the Associated Press' All-America offensive team, received 17 votes for his feats of catching 42 passes, seven for touchdowns, and picking up 607 yards.

UNAVAILABLE
In San Diego, McColl was not available for comment, but his father, W. F. McColl, greeted his son's selection as "awfully nice and a splendid tribute."

Two All-America tackles, Don Coleman of Michigan State and Jim Weatherall of Oklahoma, tied for second place with Bob Ward, Maryland's All-America guard, right at their heels.

NEXT
Bob Carey, Michigan State's All-America offensive end, was next in line with seven votes. He was followed by Pat Canamella of Southern California and Les Richter of California, each with six votes.

Rounding out the first ten (with ties) were tackle Pug Pearson and guard Ted Daffer of Tennessee with five and four votes, respectively, and Ray Beck, Georgia Tech guard, and Chuck Boerio, Illinois linebacker.

Yanks Retire Joe's Number
NEW YORK (AP)—First it was uniform No. 3 to be retired by the New York Yankees in honor of one of its most famous players. Then it was No. 4, and now—No. 5.

The Yankees announced No. 5 worn by Joe DiMaggio for 13 years as a Yankee, would be taken out of circulation and sent to the Hall of Fame with Joe's uniform, glove and bat with which he hit his last home run.

Soon after Babe Ruth left the Yankees in 1935, his number 3 was retired. Four years later Lou Gehrig's No. 2 followed suit.

HUSKIES BREAK FAN RECORD
SEATTLE (AP)—Cracking attendance records has become an annual habit at the University of Washington, which reported today it has done it again, with 267,352 people watching the football team in its 1951 home schedule of six games.

Last year, with a schedule of five games, the record was set at 207,375 people. The stadium was enlarged this year, boosting capacity from about 40,000 to 55,554. The record was beaten after five games in 1951 when crowd totals reached 216,161.

Schroeder, Trabert Blast Swedes in Davis Cup Play

MELBOURNE, Australia, (AP)—Tony Trabert and Ted Schroeder virtually swept their Swedish opponents off the courts in the first two singles matches of the U.S.-Sweden interzone Davis Cup final today and were expected to finish the job Friday by taking the doubles in similar convincing fashion.

Tony and Ted, whose selection for the singles over Vic Seixas and Dick Savitt caused some surprise, each won their singles matches in straight sets to give the U.S. a commanding 2-0 lead. A victory in the doubles will put the U.S. in the challenge round against Australia.

DOUBLES
Trabert, a Cincinnati youth on leave from the navy, crushed Sven Davidson, 6-3, 6-4, 9-7. Then the veteran Schroeder from La Crescenta, Calif., storming over Lennart Bergelin, Sweden's No. 1 player, 6-2, 6-2, 6-4. Davidson and Bergelin will pair against Tony and Ted in the doubles.

A crowd of 7000, somewhat short of Koonpong stadium's capacity, saw the one-sided matches.

Trabert defeated Davidson in the opening match by staying in the backcourt and passing the net rushing Swede or forcing him into errors.

VOLLEYS
In three sets Tony scored 39 clean winners, almost all of them on passing shots down the sidelines. Davidson had only 29 winners, 14 of them in the final set. Practically all of his were scored from the net on sharp volleys.

The match lasted an hour and one-half in a gusty wind. The sun finally popped out in the last game of the match.

SUPERB
Schroeder played a superb game in crushing Bergelin. The match was played in bright sunshine and very little wind in contrast to the Trabert-Davidson affair.

Indicative of his superiority, Schroeder scored 32 placements to Bergelin's 13 and served nine aces to none for the Swede. The match lasted only 52 minutes, the last set 18 minutes.
