Shipbuilding May Open On Pacific Coast
 SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Large-scale shipbuilding probably will be resumed on the Pacific Coast next spring—for the first time since world war two.
 This was indicated with the announcement by Bethlehem Pacific Coast Steel Corp. that it expects to have steel for a \$47,465,000 contract set for five cargo vessels.
 The vessels will be built here by the corporation's shipbuilding division for the U.S. maritime commission.
 The announcement was made by T. C. Ingersoll, general manager of the shipbuilding division. He said work had been received from Vice Adm. E. L. Cochrane, head of the maritime administration, that steel for the program would be available in the second quarter of 1952.
 If steel is received by April or May, Ingersoll said, the first keel probably will be laid in August.
 The yard now is employing about 2100 men, on repair work and conversion.
 The ships, single screw cargo carriers of the "mariner" class, will have the largest horsepower operating on a single screw propeller of any commercial ship so far built. The propelling unit will have a normal rating of 17,500 horsepower.
 Bethlehem's contract brought to 35 the number of this type of vessel awarded by the maritime administration so far. Work already is under way on the other contracts on the East and Gulf coasts.
 Some work was started by Bethlehem last summer on the program but suspended in October for lack of steel.

Police Probe Double Death
 WORCESTER, Mass., (AP)—Police today were seeking the motive for a double slaying in which Dr. O. Draper Phelps, 70, was shot and killed in his office yesterday by a 60 year old patient who then killed himself.
 Police identified the assailant as Diogenes Boudouvis, 52-year-old retired restaurateur who had been under the doctor's care the past year.
 Phelps' body was found on the floor. Boudouvis was sprawled on the doctor's couch, a bullet wound in the head. He died shortly after admittance to City hospital without regaining consciousness. A .38 calibre revolver was found beside Boudouvis.

Senator Sees Truman, Taft

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Sen. Anderson (D-NM) said today he looks for a "tight race" between Pres. Truman and Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) for the presidency in 1952.
 Anderson, who talked with Truman at the White House yesterday, told a reporter he is firmly convinced the president will seek a new term. He said the matter was not discussed with Truman.
 Conceding that present charges of corruption and graft in the government will be a major issue in next year's campaign "unless they are cleaned up quickly," Anderson said he expects "drastic action" from the president along that score.
 A Midwestern conference of Democrats at Chicago yesterday pledged "wholehearted support" for any cleanup moves the president makes.
 Anderson, who heads his party's senatorial campaign committee, said he doesn't believe Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will get the Republican presidential nomination.
 "I think Taft is going to be the Republicans' choice," he said. "It will be Truman-vs-Taft and that will be a tight race."
 "I want to get these corruption and graft charges cleaned up so that we can make the campaign on issues on which we can beat Taft."
 Taft already has said he doesn't believe any Truman-appointed group can clean its own house and for that reason expects the morality issue to be a top one.

Men Go Wild Over Nylons

WOLVERHAMPTON, Eng., (AP)—Police were called on Friday to try to repel an invasion of a local store which had advertised a sale of 5000 pair of scarce nylons to "men only" as a Christmas gesture.
 Some 15,000 men surged into the store when it opened, pushed back police, elbowed aside shop cases, shoved past fainting girls and vaulted counters to get at the stockings.
 When the mob finally pulled out with the last of the stockings the store manager said bleakly: "We never expected crowds of this kind."

Steel Strike Threat Looms

PITTSBURGH, (AP)—The possibility of a nationwide steel strike Year's Day is a matter of grave concern in government circles today.
 But at the same time, Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam informed the steel industry that any automatic price increase based on a wage raise would not be permitted.
 Putnam said yesterday in Washington he told the industry that if it is entitled to increased prices under the Caphart amendment the proceeds can be used for wage boosts in current negotiations.
 Voicing the government's concern of a strike possibility were two ace federal mediators, Clyde Mills and Walter A. Maggloio. After taking a quick look at the progress of contract talks here between the CIO United Steelworkers and U.S. Steel Corp., they declared: "The possibility of a steel strike poses a very serious situation because of the economic effect it would have, in addition to its effect on our defense effort. There is great concern over the possibilities of a work stoppage."
 The union's contract with U.S. Steel and most other steel producers expires at midnight December 31. A strike can begin immediately after that.
