Ruling Might Put Damper On Dubious Mining Claims

A ruling by the U.S. bureau of land management's Portland regional office made a few days ago might throw a family-size monkey wrench into the plans of a good many persons who have staked out mining claims on forest service land.

The ruling declared null and void 43 claims of 160 acres each in timberlands near Randle, Wash., on grounds the locations were not properly made and that the necessary annual assessment work was not done.

The claims near Randle were made ostensibly on a thin layer of pumice, but the land involved in the 7160 acres is a part of the Gifford Pinchot national forest.

Rosecoe E. Bell, land management bureau regional administrator who announced the veto on the 43 claims, said adverse proceedings would be started against 72 more claims in the same area.

Claim-staking on the Gifford Pinchot forest has been paralleled by claim-staking on the Rogue River and Deschutes national forests in Southern and Central Oregon, and perhaps not quite so extensive as it has been down here.

The latest count in this vicinity showed about 28,000 acres of Deschutes forest land and up to 80,000 acres of Rogue River forest land under mining claims, most of them filed in the past two years.

PRECIOUS METALS

In the Rogue River forest the claims have been staked for precious metals—gold, silver and platinum—which are supposed to be recoverable from the soil. In the Deschutes forest the claims have been made on pumice, which is known

to abound in the northern portion of Klamath county and which is being worked commercially by at least one concern.

But the real object of all the mining activity may be, although no one has flatly said so, the timber on the land.

The federal mining law, enacted in 1872, allows placer claims on unreserved public lands for all minerals not occurring in lode or vein formation. The definition of "mineral" is extremely vague. It covers whatever is considered a mineral by the standard authorities.

The law allows a 20-acre claim, or eight-man 160-acre association claims, without limit as to how many claims the "association" of eight persons may take up.

The filing fee is but \$1, and annual assessment work has to be done on a hundred dollar value, and doesn't take much work to amount to that much.

Claims on the Gifford Pinchot, Rogue River and Deschutes forests have been made under provisions of this law, and if the claims are eventually proven up in accordance with law the land and everything on it becomes property of the miner.

SIMPLE TO DO

But even before the claims are proved, just the act of staking and filing ties up the property so that nothing can be done on it without the claimant's permission. The timber can't be cut by the claimant, but neither can it be put up for sale by the forest service.

Last fall the Deschutes forest had a small fire (25 acres) and to get clearance to salvage the fire-damaged timber the service had to get the permission of 14 different owners to 17 different mining claims

Remember Mitzi? She's Back After Being Gone 15 Years

HOLLYWOOD, Calif.—A former film star is returning to the screen after a 15-year absence, but she's no grey-haired oldtimer.

The returnee is Mitzi Green, a veteran of 25 years in show business but a youthful 31 years old. If you were going to the movies

20 years ago, you'll remember her pert face and sprightly acting in many a picture.

Having been an ardent fan in that vintage, I can readily recall her Becky Thatcher opposite Jackie Coogan's Tom Sawyer. I can also recall when she cavorted with Wheeler and Woolsey in "Girl Crazy," which she used a cookie for a monocle and imitated George Arliss. Therefore it was a bit of a shock to find that she is now grown up and the mother of three children.

Mitzi is currently acting as one of the foils for Abbott and Costello in thrasher of their far-flung epics, "Lost in Alaska." It was a good choice for her return, since the impromptu nature of Abbott and Costello pictures would preclude any nervousness on her part.

"Naturally, I felt a little jumpy about doing a picture after 15 years," she remarked.

"When I arrived on the set, Jean Yarbrough, the director, suggested that I run through the scene. I went through it breezily, but I thought I heard a noise, like a camera running. When I got through, Jean said 'cut.' I had done my first scene and didn't know it."

Since then she's been getting along swimmingly, and now she's eager to do more pictures.

Mitzi came by her talent naturally, being the daughter of a vaudeville team. At four, she was entertaining people backstage with her impressions of Moran and Mack, and it wasn't long before she was doing her stuff onstage. She got her break in pictures in 1929, at the age of eight.

"Actually, I was only in pictures three or four years," she remarked. "I came back in 1936 to do my last picture, 'Transatlantic Merry-Go-Round,' which was Jack Benny's first film."

After that, she returned to the stage, scoring hits in Broadway shows, in vaudeville and lately as a night club star. She is doing a lot of her old imitations, and she still has many fans who call for the George Arliss routine.

Unlike many former child stars, Mitzi appears to have found a successful married life. She is the wife of Joseph Pevey, Broadway actor and now a film director at Universal-International studios. They have three children: Joel, 7, Jan, 4, and Jeff, 8 months.
