

Assailant To Face Jury Wednesday

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Actors' agent Jennings Lang is to be subpoenaed to appear next Wednesday at Walter Wanger's arraignment on charges of shooting him with intent to kill.

Dist. Atty. Ernest Roll said he would serve the subpoena "to establish the jurisdiction of my office in this case."

Lang, shot in the groin Dec. 13 because of what Wanger said were his attentions to Wanger's wife, actress Joan Bennett, may leave the hospital today or tomorrow, doctors said. The district attorney has not been able to question Lang about the shooting.

IDLE SINCE 1936, BIG SNOWPLOW WARMED UP

Since world war two days Rosie the Riveter, the much sung about female defense worker, has been pretty much on the shelf.

But right here in Klamath Falls we have a lady worker whose record of inactivity stems all the way back to the winter of 1936.

She's Rosalee, the SP's rotary snowplow, tipping the scale at 150 ironclad tons.

Every September since "the winter of 1936"—one that oldtimers recall as the year of the big snow—Rosalee has been given a complete checkup and energized with steam on an hour's readiness basis to clear the tracks.

Back in '36 all \$150,000 worth of Rosalee was really put to the test. For two solid weeks, without a stop except for changes of crews, the giant oil burning, steam boiler locomotive burrowed its 12-foot fan blades into snowdrifts along the SP right-of-ways, throwing snow as far as an eighth of a mile.

The plow, with its crew of five or more men, bulled its way from Klamath Falls to Dunsmuir, thence to Ashland and back to Mt. Shasta. From there it went to McCloud, Calif., where the town had not had fresh food or supplies for a week.

Along with a similar type rotary plow, Rosalee was built in 1928 and bought by the SP.

Since that time, according to Sanford Beby, SP roundhouse foreman, the giant machine has actually done only about 42 days work.

Last winter she limbered up her muscles a bit on a short jaunt to Crescent Lake, but was only sent there for protection purposes and never put to work.

Rosalee is never brought out of semi-retirement unless things get really bad.

The ordinary track clearing work

in this division is done by two flanger cars which cut ice and snow between the rails, a Jordan spreader, capable of spreading its wings 20 feet on each side of the track and a locomotive with a pilot snow plow in front.

All steam and diesel locomotives also have their own small plows.

But when the going gets rough, railroad men know they can call on Rosalee on an hour's notice and that she will be all steamed up and ready to work.

Steel Strike Impasse Unbroken As Murray Asks Huge Price Boost For Men

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Government price officials today apparently held the key to a door which federal mediators might open to avert a threatened steel strike.

With the New Year's Day strike deadline of the CIO steelworkers only ten days away, chief mediator Cyrus B. Ching reported a complete lack of progress in negotiations.

"It seems to me it's a major domestic crisis," Ching told newsmen.

Ching plunged ahead today, however, with his conferences (9:30 a.m. EST) with CIO President Philip Murray and representatives of ten steel firms seeing some way out of the impasse.

Murray's demands for an average 18 1/2 cent hourly pay boost for steelworkers—including a 15-cent general increase, plus job rate changes estimated to cost 3 1/2 cents per man—have been met by no counter-offer to date from the steel companies.

The industry takes the position it must get price relief for any wage concessions it makes. It has contended that every cent-an-hour in increased wages cost the industry 20 million dollars a year.

Price Stabilizer Michael V. DiSalle has been having talks with steelmen on how much they can expect under the Caphart provision of the economic controls act. This permits price boosts to compensate for increased labor and other costs up to last July 26.

DiSalle and other officials have conceded that the steel-makers have something coming under the Caphart provision (named after one of its authors, Senator Caphart, Indiana Republican).

DiSalle has insisted however, that the steel companies can expect no price revisions to pay for new wage concessions.

Much depends upon the amount DiSalle's office figures steel has coming as a Caphart allowance. There is no precise way for figuring this, and the result usually the industry sufficiently to prompt a wage offer satisfactory to Murray.

That appeared to be about the only way to win an agreement which would avoid a strike. And a walkout would have obviously

serious effects at a time when the steel industry has record production, yet is not producing enough to fill both defense and civilian needs.
