Father Flanagan's Boys Town Choir of 55 voices will present a special broadcast of Christmas music tomorrow at 3:30, sponsored by the Stanley Home Products Co. The program will include a brief talk by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Nicholas H. Wegner, director of Boys' Town. The sponsor has been presenting the Boys Town Choir at Christmas and on Mother's Day for several years. Rev. Francis P. Schmitt is director of the choir.

Another special Christmas feature scheduled for tomorrow is the annual First Federal Savings & Loan program, presenting the choir of the First Presbyterian Church, 7:30-8:00 p.m. Mrs. George McIntyre, organist, besides accompanying the choir, will sing "O Holy Night", by Adam. Tonight and for two more weeks, 8:30 on Saturdays for "U.S.S.R."

Tonight's West-Hitchcock program, 9:30-10, will again feature Miss Harriet Mueller as organist, and Phil Hitchcock giving the reading. Marvin Nereth will be the soloist.

The old favorite Dicken's "Christmas Carol" as told by Lionel Barrymore is tonight's "Bedtime Story" 7:30-8.

Army Trying Out Newest Uniform

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Men of the army's oldest regiment start wearing the army's newest uniform today.

The uniform, a greenish gray experimental winter outfit, will be donned for a months-long series of tests by soldiers of the third (old guard) infantry regiment. One of its battalions is stationed here at Fort Leavenworth, Mo., and the other at Fort Myer in nearby Virginia.

The material is 16-ounce serge, 85 percent wool and 15 percent nylon. It eliminates the service jacket usually called the "Eisenhower jacket" and replaces it with semi-formfitting coat with lapels.

This is just an experiment, the army quartermaster corps stressed and no one will be required to buy new uniforms. It is separate and distinct from the field uniform and "designed for general wear."

Highway Cost Sets Record

Oregon spent more on highways in 1951 than in any previous year in history, according to the year-end report of the state highway commission.

Its disbursements for the year and its highway income was about \$38,900,000, exclusive of income from bond sales.

Gross revenues from such sources as the gasoline tax, registration fees, commercial trucks fees and fines are expected to come to \$44,200,000 and to exceed the 1950 revenues by \$1,700,000.

From the gross take the highway commission has to pay \$8,500,000 to the counties for use on county roads; \$4,350,000 to cities for use on city streets; \$1,050,000 to the state police. Thus its gross tax and fine take is reduced to about \$30,200,000.

But added to it will be federal aid amounting to \$7,000,000 and \$1,600,000 from other sources to bring the total highway income back up to \$38,900,000.

Highway construction costs have amounted to about \$19,900,000 for the year; maintenance \$11,100,000; rights-of-way \$3,400,000; operating expenses \$4,000,000; and other capital outlay \$1,600,000.

Approximately 70 percent of the construction for the year was federally aided, which means that 60 percent of the cost exclusive of rights-of-way was furnished by the federal government and 40 percent by the highway commission.

You get all made up and you can't show any emotion. You're afraid you're going to crack your make-up or lose your false eyelashes. Negro Thrush Sues Newsmen

NEW YORK, (AP)—Josephine Baker, Negro entertainer, has filed a \$400,000 damage suit against columnist Walter Winchell, the Hearst Corp. and King Features Syndicate.

The suit, filed Friday in federal court, charges that Winchell "maliciously, wantonly and recklessly" printed and published items attacking her October 25 and six other occasions.

The singer and dancer, an American-born French citizen, visited the Stork club last October 16. There, she claimed, she and her party had to wait for an hour for their order to be filled.

Miss Baker said Winchell was present during the incident, which club employees blamed on what she called "unavoidable delays."

The entertainer contends that Winchell resented publicity concerning his presence and that he "embarked upon a public campaign to vilify, libel and damage" Winchell in her reputation and professional standing in the community.

Miss Baker charges that Winchell wrote items implying she was a Fascist, a Communist, an anti-Semite, "an enemy of peace" and of her own race and "a person of low, doubtful character."

Miss Baker seeks \$100,000 for loss of employment, \$200,000 for publication of the items and \$100,000 punitive damages.

Now It's Moos And Cows That Upset U.N. Men

PARIS, (AP)—Whether a cow that mooed a lot gives less milk than a quiet, contented bossy has become an issue in the United Nations political committee.

British Minister of State Selwyn Lloyd began it by reminding the garrulous Soviet Foreign Minister, Andrei V. Vishinsky, that there was an old Russian proverb to the effect that the more a cow moos the less milk it gives.

Vishinsky snapped back that there was no such Russian proverb and it would be a silly proverb anyhow, something like saying "the more a man talks, the less he is able to reproduce his kind."

Today Lloyd apologized, it wasn't a Russian proverb, he said, but a Polish one.

Vishinsky thought it silly. Lloyd declared, he ought to take it up with the Polish delegate.

"Perhaps," he said, "Polish cows behave differently from Russian cows." If this were true, Lloyd added, the dangerous deviation should be corrected in the interest of Cominform solidarity.

Jupiter Moon Discovered

PASADENA, (AP)—Now it's official: the Mount Wilson observatory had confirmed the discovery of a new moon for the planet Jupiter.

Dr. Seth B. Nicholson earlier reported the find as a "probable" after his first observations. Subsequent studies confirmed the find, the observatory disclosed today.

The moon is Jupiter's 12th, and the planet's fourth to be discovered by Dr. Nicholson. The satellite is about 15 miles in diameter and revolves clockwise around Jupiter.

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HIGHER MILK

HEATLE, (AP)—The office of price stabilization Friday granted a one-cent a quart increase in the price of milk in King, Pierce, Shoshone, Knap and Mason counties.

More than 100 gifts, scheduled to be distributed to the children, were stolen Friday and the pretty gift wrappings left strewn in disorder amid ransacked desks. Also missing was 15 pounds of candy which was to be distributed to 40 kindergarten pupils.
