British Guarding Stone Of Scone

LONDON, (AP)—England is taking no chances on Scottish marauders walking off with her Stone of Scone this Christmas.

Last night detectives began a Yuletide watch in Westminster abbey where Scottish Nationalists last Christmas seized the stone from under the king's coronation chair.

Actually the stone is now concealed in a vault beneath the abbey, but authorities are being careful just the same.

The 336-pound block of masonry was brought to England by Edward I in 1296 from the old abbey of Scone in Perthshire, Scotland. It is regarded by Scottish Nationalists as the "stone of destiny."

The stone was returned to British authorities last April.

Tree Safety Care Urged

A gayly decorated Christmas tree may be a menace to life and property...

Saturday evening, Mrs. Ralph Stearns, flipped a switch to light up the Yule tree in the Stearns home, 348 Pacific Terrace. There was a flash and almost instantaneously, the colorful tree was a giant torch.

Before the flames could be subdued, floor and rugs had been damaged, some Christmas presents ruined and the house filled with smoke.

Dr. Stearns said the fire was apparently caused by a short in the tree lights wiring.

City Fire Chief Roy Rowe has issued a special warning on the danger of Yule tree fires.

Tree lights should be carefully checked for frayed insulation that may cause a short circuit.

"There are plenty of lights on sale," said Chief Rowe, "but a new set of lights is far cheaper than the lives of your family or a new home."

The chief also warned about position of the lights on the tree. He pointed out that the little bulbs get very hot and that the little pine fir or cedar needles are highly inflammable. "Don't let any needles touch the bulbs," said Rowe.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters in a special bulletin warns that "under no circumstances are cotton or paper to be used as decorations on or around the tree."

WHEN WAS JOHNSTOWN FLOOD?

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Lake County Phone Line Service Eyed

LAKEVIEW—Progress toward a solution of the problem of re-establishing satisfactory telephone communications for the Adel-Plush and the Summer Lake areas, plus the possibility of finding a workable plan for improving county-wide telephone service, was made here Tuesday at a telephone service meeting conducted by the Lake county chamber of commerce at the county courthouse.

The meeting was prepared by the chamber's communications committee and Jack Briscoe, chamber president, was chairman. It was attended by G. E. Krieger, assistant general manager for the West Coast Telephone Company, and W. F. Jones, radio engineer for the company, both from Everett, Wash.; by S. J. Maera, electrical engineer, and James Conklin, telephone engineer, both with the Oregon Public Utilities Commission, Salem; and by about 50 ranchers, farmers, business and industrial men of Lake county.

Purpose of the meeting was to seek answers from the telephone company on a number of problems: 1—did the company have a plan for re-establishing the Summer Lake-Silver Lake and the Adel Plush phone service which was disrupted about two years ago when the REA extension power lines caused interference with the phone company's grounded lines; 2—would the company offer a plan for improving the rural phone service in other rural areas of the county; 3—would the company enter with local logging companies, the Forest Service and other parties into a joint plan for establishing radio-telephone facilities on top of Black Cap.

Outcome of the meeting was: 1—acceptance of an offer by Krieger to submit by March 1, 1952 a new proposal for the Warner Valley portion of its suggested plan for re-establishing the Adel-Plush and the

Summer Lake-Silver Lake service; 2—acceptance of an offer by Krieger to submit by May 1, 1952 a proposal for improving the farm-line and subscriber-owned line phone services in other parts of the county; 3—acceptance by the phone company of the invitation to join in the Black Cap installation providing the phone subscribers in the affected communities would accept the company's service proposals.
