HIGH-COST POLLUTION FIGHT IS AGENCY PLAN

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A cooperative state and federal survey recommends a 15 million dollar municipal program in the upper Columbia river basin to combat water pollution.

The report, issued this week, was prepared by the U.S. public health service in cooperation with the Washington state pollution control commission.

The basin is defined as including all the area draining into the Columbia river below the Canadian border and above the mouth of the Yakima river, exclusive of the Spokane river drainage.

While stating that organic pollution of the region's waters is not great in comparison with other basins of the Pacific Northwest, the report said known requirements for treatment of municipal wastes include six new plants, enlargement of one plant and re-

Land and Brewster—the latter to include a complete sewer system.

Replacement of existing plants was recommended at Chewelah, Ritzville, Cashmere, Coulee City, Harrison, Reardon and Waterville. Quincy should enlarge its facilities.

The report said industrial waste treatment requirements still are undetermined, but added that 10 of the 39 industrial plants are known to provide inadequate treatment.

Pointing to the Hanford atomic energy plant's requirements for large amounts of clean water, the report warned that "certain types of wastes entering the Columbia river above the atomic energy plant water intake could be a serious handicap in the processing of radioactive materials."

"For this reason," it added, "studies are needed on pollution returns flows in the Columbia basin irrigation project and on other polluting wastes that could enter the river from this project's development."

Referring further to the Hanford plant, the report said present information indicates the concentration of radioactive materials in wastes discharged by that plant are below established tolerance standards.

Reds Blast Kennan For Ambassador

MOSCOW, (AP)—George F. Kennan, American diplomat appointed for the job of U.S. ambassador to Moscow, was attacked today in Pravda, the official Communist party paper.

It called him a supporter of anti-Soviet organizations and listed the East European firms of the Ford Foundation among these. (Kennan resigned as president of the fund November 23. The Pravda attack appeared to be geared to Russia's current "anti-Soviet" propaganda campaign.)

Criticism of Kennan's work for the fund was in a dispatch from a Pravda correspondent in the United States.

The attack indicated Kennan, a Russian-speaking student of Russian life and widely recognized Western authority on Soviet government affairs, would not be acceptable as ambassador to Moscow.

(Pres. Truman said November 20 Kennan was being considered to succeed Ambassador Allan G. Kirk. The president commented that Kennan had an important part in developing the American policy for containment of Communism and "certainly ought to know his way around out there.")

Excerpts from the Pravda article, printed on the foreign events page, said:

"In the current year, the most generous appropriations from this (Ford) fund have been given for activation of underground activity of various anti-Soviet elements and the conduct of subversive anti-Soviet propaganda, particularly radio propaganda.

"The fund is managed by the former administrator of the Marshall plan, Paul Hoffman, and the direct activity of subsidizing anti-Soviet organizations is directed by George Kennan, now listed as 'on vacation.'"

The Pravda article listed other prominent Americans it said were engaged in various ways in subversive activity against Russia. Among them are former State Secy. Sumner Welles, ex-Pres. Herbert Hoover, Gen. George C. Marshall, Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark, U.S.-U.N. Ambassador Warren R. Austin, New York's Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, and Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.)

Wanger Has Xmas At Home

HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—Film producer Walter Wanger spent a peaceful Christmas day with wife Joan Bennett and their two small daughters in the family home yesterday for the first time since he was arrested 13 days ago on charges that he shot Jennings Lang. At the time Wanger told police that Lang was breaking up his home.

His arraignment in nearby Santa Monica superior court. Wanger was indicted by the county grand jury after the parking lot shooting in which Lang was wounded in the groin.

Wanger arrived at his Beverly Hills home at 7 a.m. for a Christmas breakfast with his daughters, Stephanie, 8½, and Shelley, 3. Then Miss Bennett joined them and they all went to the girls' second-story playroom to open presents. There was a turkey dinner in the evening.

Despite the pleasant family gathering, friends said there was little possibility that the Wangers will be reconciled. He moved out of the house right after the shooting.

Lang recently left a hospital and is recuperating at his home.

Madman Shoots Up Quebec Town

SHAWINIGAN FALLS, Que., (AP)—A lonely Christmas drove Jean-Marie Trotter mad.

The 24-year-old bachelor gun and sword hobbyist heard the joyous sounds of revelers, the all-night Christmas merriment parties following midnight mass for the French-speaking people.

They were not for him.

Alone, he prowled the streets, shooting as he went, terrorizing people as he went.

First he wounded Police Sergeant Mathias Lachance.

Then he killed Constable Louis Langevin, 58, the favorite cop of the village children.

A manhunt was started with shoot to kill orders.

Five hours later Trotter's body was found in a snowbank with his head blown off by a charge from his .303 rifle.

The verdict of the coroner was murder and suicide while of unsound mind at 2 a.m. Christmas morning.

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Korean Truce To End Tomorrow

MUNSAN, Korea, (AP)—A 30-day truce trial period ends in Korea tomorrow. But armistice negotiations will go right on.

The freezing 145-mile front may remain quiet. Or it may explode in a violent end to 30 days of twilight war. That was anybody's guess. Authorities disagreed.

Passing of the deadline will wipe out a tentative cease-fire line. It then must be re-drawn, if an armistice is signed, to show actual battle changes.

The official 30-day deadline, a U.N. command spokesman said, is midnight Thursday. That's 10 a.m. Thursday, EST.

Slide Blocks SP Line At Wicopee

For the second time in four days, the Southern Pacific main line yesterday was blocked by a slide for several hours at Wicopee, 130 miles north of Klamath Falls.
