Range Bull Care Needed

Proper care of the range bulls this winter will affect next year's calf crop. Farm Advisor Ken Bagholt cautions livestock men. Conditioning of range bulls before they are turned into the breeding herd is one of the important factors in securing a high percentage of calf crop. Bulls that have come off the range will have lost weight, as a rule. Observation of the bulls at that time will indicate whether they should have supplemental feeding. Close check during the winter months will show whether they are being fed enough to bring them to condition before the breeding season starts. The amount of concentrates or other supplemental feed will vary with the pasture and roughage available. Under exceptional pasture conditions, bulls may gain satisfactorily with little or no additional feed. Feeding of two or three pounds of cottonseed meal or a mixture of grain and meal may be necessary under most range conditions. Over-fat bulls are undesirable for breeding. Bulls should be in a field where they can get ample exercise in addition to ample feed.

Cattle Lice Controlable

Cattle lice can become quite a problem during the winter months, their favorite time for increasing. However, treating beef cattle with benzene hexachloride usually will hold the pest in check for the season, reports Farm Advisor Ken Bagholt of the University of California agricultural extension service, Tulare. A single dipping or a thorough spraying usually is sufficient. Benzene hexachloride is on the market under several different brand names. Following the manufacturer's recommendations usually will give the correct concentration. If there is some question about this, your Farm Advisor's office can help you determine the right mixture of water and materials to use. Lice are ancient but important pests. They make the animal uncomfortable, cause reduced gains, and help spread infection.

Tree Wounds Protection

When pruning trees during the dormant winter season, cover the large wounds on the tree with a protective coating, suggests Farm Advisor Ken Bagholt of the University of California agricultural extension service. This is important for cuts exposing an appreciable amount of heart wood. Painting the wounds will prevent the growth of fungi and other wood rotting organisms until the wound heals. An excellent paint for this purpose can be prepared by mixing equal parts of powdered blue-stone and slacked lime, then adding enough raw linseed oil to make a consistency of thick paint. Commercial tree paints containing copper also can be purchased. Allowing the wound to dry completely before applying the paint will help in obtaining good penetration and a more lasting coating.

Turkey Circular At Advisor's

Breeding and raising high quality turkeys for meat, hatching eggs, and breeding stock are discussed in the new circular "Turkey Production in California" recently published by the University of California College of Agriculture. Written by V. S. Amundson, professor of poultry husbandry, and F. H. Kratzer, associate professor of poultry husbandry, this is a necessary handbook for turkey growers in California. It is available from the Farm Advisor's office in Tulare.

Lots'a Work -- Lawns

Two and a half hours work a week are necessary to care for every four hundred square feet of lawn. How to plant and care for the lawn and to control diseases and weeds are discussed in the new circular "Lawn Planting and Care," recently published by the University of California Agricultural Extension Service. It is written by H. M. Butterfield, agriculturalist, Warren Schoonover, extension soils specialist, and Harry W. Shepherd, professor of landscape architecture, University of California College of Agriculture.
