## Council To Eye Ordinance

An ordinance redrawing but not revising initiative and referendum procedures in connection with the Klamath Falls city government is ready for presentation to the City Council.

It coordinates the provisions of two other ordinances, one adopted May 19, 1950, and the other adopted July 17, 1950.

The ordinance sets up the method of using the initiative petition or referendum, public legislative devices, in city affairs.

An initiative petition for (to place on the ballot) any proposed ordinance charter amendment or measure, must be signed by a number of qualified voters equal to 15 percent of the number casting a vote for mayor in the last preceding municipal election.

A referendum petition against (to repeal or vote) any measure passed by the City Council, must be signed by qualified voters equal to 10 percent of the number voting for mayor in the last municipal election.

The ordinance also sets up a \$100 fine plus 30 days in jail for violation of its provision, including signing an initiative or referendum petition more than once or falsely.

## Parr Death Confirmed

Official word of the death of Cpl. Charles O. Parr, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Parr, Klamath Falls, was received here this month by his mother from Parr's commanding officer in Okinawa.

The officer, Lt. Col. John P. Couch, USAF, wrote that Parr died when the B-29 "Dragon Lady," of which he was a crew member, developed a fire in one engine. Two crewmen bailed out before the plane exploded in the air. That was on Oct. 31.

Lt. Col. Couch said Parr's body had been definitely identified and was being shipped home for burial. He said the cause of the plane fire was undetermined.

A ground crewman, Sgt. Don Wiley, Medford, told Parr's parents here he was with Parr the night before he was killed. He said the plane, headed for Korea, had released its bombs before the plane crashed. However, he explained the plane carried some 6000 gallons of gasoline for the Korean run. The crash occurred on an island but 40 miles from the Okinawan air force base.

Parr was a member of the 30th Squadron, 19th Bombardment Group, Medium, based on the Ryukyu island southeast of Japan.

## Ship Burning Probe Pushed

**ASTORIA (U)**—A Coast Guard hearing continued here Thursday into the fire in which 11 persons perished aboard the Danish ship Erria a week ago.

Cdr. James Wilkinson, officer conducting the hearing, said the chief engineer, second mate, the river pilot, and some others would be called to testify in an effort to determine the cause of the fire.

Two witnesses testified Wednesday they were unable to say how the fire started.

Capt. Neils Agee said the fire spread with such unbelievable swiftness that gases must have formed between decks, then exploded.

He said he could not explain why eight passengers' bodies were found in the ship's lounge because the lounge doors were open and the lights were on at the time the fire was first abandoned.

Agee said the first indication of fire aboard the vessel came from smoldering rags and waste in a locker in the crew's quarters. He said it was thrown overboard about 2:40 a. m. on Dec. 20, soon after the ship had lifted anchor to head out to sea. It had been anchored in the mouth of the Columbia river.

The captain said he sent Carl Jorgensen, ship's electrician, to investigate after other reports of fire came from the crew's quarters.

As the smoke continued to spread through the ship, evacuation of the 114 passengers and crew members aboard started, Agee said. All but eight passengers and three crewmen reached safety.

## Ransom Pay Wrong Move

**BOSTON (U)**—Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R-Mass.) said Wednesday night "the United States has retrograded a great deal when we have to pay blackmail" for the release of U. S. fliers imprisoned in Communist Hungary.

He told newsmen in a press conference that "there was a time when America didn't have to pay tribute."

He said release of the fliers could have been effected by diplomatic negotiations without paying the \$120,000 in fines and without the affair coming to a "force of arms."

In a prepared address earlier he urged the acceptance of Japan, Nationalist China and Franco Spain as fighting partners against Communism.

## Bravery Wins Soldier Medal

**TOKYO (U)**—A Leavenworth, Wash., soldier who evacuated two wounded men through enemy-held ground in Korea was awarded the Army's Distinguished Service Cross Thursday.

Sgt. Royal A. Wisemore was one of five soldiers who received the DSC. America's second highest award for gallantry. Wisemore was given the medal for action near Kusan Nov. 28, 1950, with the Medical Co., 5th Regiment, 24th Division.

Wisemore's citation said: "Finding the return route cut off while he tried to rescue a third soldier, Wisemore joined two other men engaged in a firefight, shielding the wounded man with his body. The three distracted the Communists long enough to give the wounded man a chance to crawl to safety, believing he had made it. But, as they reached safer positions, Wisemore heard the third wounded man call for help and returned through heavy fire to carry him to cover."

## Dean Letters' Broadcast

**SAN FRANCISCO (U)**—Red China's Peiping radio has broadcast letters it said were from Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, now in a North Korean prison camp to the wife and daughter in California.

The broadcast Wednesday was recorded here by the Associated Press and the letters were relayed to Mrs. Dean in Berkeley. She said they sounded authentic.

The letters said he was well cared for and had become fond of rice, the staple of the orient. But he expressed a longing for "fried beef" just like his mother makes.

The letters were filled with remembrances of anniversaries. He wondered hopefully if he had become a grandfather. He has.

A son, Robert Dean Williams, was born to his daughter nine months ago. That was just five months after the U. S. 25th Division Commander disappeared on the Korean battlefield. The Communists say the general is in a prison camp near Pyongyang, the North Korean capital.

"I hope that the uncertainty surrounding my disappearance was not too much for you and mother," Dean wrote his wife. "I am sorry that I have been the cause of so much concern."

## American Idea Spread Urged

**OLYMPIA (U)**—Rep. Henry M. Jackson D-Wash. says the United States needs a "positive political approach, lest Russia take over the world without firing a shot."

"We ought to export more American ideas and less dollars," Jackson told the Young Men's Business Club Wednesday. "One to two thousand college graduates sent overseas could do more to stop Communism than all the billions. They would spread the ideas of democracy and justice as missionaries did in years gone by."

Jackson, a member of the House Committee on Atomic Energy, also warned that the U.S. does not have enough B-36 long range bombers to deliver atomic bombs effectively from bases in North America.

He called for a buildup in military strength as well as a strong political policy.
