

Revenuers Deny Master Plan In Filing Of Tax Liens Against Suspects

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Internal Revenue Bureau spokesman says he knows of no coordinated pattern in the filing of tax liens against persons who have figured in a House investigation of tax collection irregularities.

Liens were filed Thursday against Abraham Teitelbaum, Chicago attorney, and Henry Grunewald, Washington man who refused to answer questions before a House subcommittee.

And it was disclosed that a tax lien was filed Nov. 19 against property believed to be held in Houston, Texas, by Troy Whitehead, Whitehead's name came up in the inquiry as having taken government officials on pleasure trips in his airplane.

A spokesman for the Revenue Bureau said he didn't know of any "concerted effort" which might be indicated by the actions.

Teitelbaum told the House group early this month he had been threatened by two Florida men with "bad tax trouble" unless he paid them \$500,000. He said the two claimed to be in contact with a combination of high Washington

officials, all of whom said they knew of no such clique.

Liens were filed in Chicago against Teitelbaum, his wife, his law partner and the partner's wife. They charge the four owe more than \$500,000 in back taxes, penalties and interest.

The lien against Grunewald and his wife charges he owes \$51,157 for 1950 income taxes. It was filed in Miami, Fla., where Grunewald has an expensive home and other property.

Four liens aggregating \$1,528,464 were filed at Houston against Whitehead, the machinery company he heads, and his wife. They allege he owes the amount on taxes for the years 1942-46 and for 1950.

Vets Get Crack At Farm Lands

SALEM (AP)—World War II veterans will get the first chance to buy 38 farm units in a public land opening near Moses Lake and Adrian, Wash., the State Veterans Department said Thursday.

The land is in the Columbia Basin project. Veterans' applications must be filed by Jan. 28 in the office of the Bureau of Reclamation at Ephrata, Wash.

The units average 75 acres.

Catfish Cleanout Gets OK Ruling

SALEM (AP)—The State Game Commission has power to hire a commercial fisherman to remove the catfish from Ten Mile Lake in Coos county, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Thursday.

The Game Commission said the lake has so many catfish in it that they are becoming diseased and runty, and are endangering other kinds of fish.

The catfish can be removed only by seining, the Commission said.

American Sabre Jets Score Victory In Clear Korean Skies As Red Migs Swarm In Area Seeking Showdown

SEOUL, Korea, (AP)—American Sabre jets shot down two Red jets and badly damaged another in a renewal of air battles over Northwest Korea Thursday, the Fifth Air force reported.

The Migs-1bs were shot down in a 30-minute battle between 22 Sabres and 50 tight-minded Migs. Earlier 100 Migs had run for cover when a flight of Sabres opened up on them. The Fifth Air Force said no American planes were hurt in either encounter.

The air war broke out anew in clear skies as Allied infantrymen fought in knee deep snow and sub-zero temperatures near Heartbreak ridge to regain an advance position cut off by the Reds.

The Communists have been fighting intermittently since Christmas night to capture and hold the outpost.

A company of Reds attacked

again shortly after last midnight, just 24 hours before the end of a 30-day truce trial period.

The fight continued through the bitter cold early morning darkness. By 7 a.m. the Reds cut off the position.

United Nations troops counter-attacked at 11:10 a.m., the U.S. Eighth Army reported, and at noon "were fighting in knee deep snow to regain the position."

Chilled infantrymen of both sides stayed mainly behind their own lines. Patrols, as always, roamed the no-man's-land between them. The U.S. Eighth Army reported that, for the third day within a month, no American soldiers were killed in ground action in the 24 hours ending 6 p.m. Wednesday.

In the air, while the Sabre jets hunted for Migs and flew cover for heavier planes, fighter-bombers resumed their relentless attacks

on North Korean roads, rails and supply lines.
