Court Says Union Guilty As Charged

CHICAGO (AP)—A National Labor Relations Board ruling that the AFL International Typographical Union and its Chicago local 16 violated the Taft-Hartley law was upheld Thursday by the U. S. Court of Appeals.

The NLRB ruling was in connection with the long strike of local 16 against five major Chicago daily newspapers. The newspapers continued publishing with substitute methods during the strike of some 1,500 printers.

The ITU was found guilty by the NLRB in October, 1949, of setting up a "bargaining strategy" which tried to impose closed shop conditions in the newspaper publishing industry. The board petitioned the court last January for enforcement of its order against ITU as NLRB orders must be backed by court decrees to be enforceable.

The appeals court also held that the NLRB erred in dismissing a charge against the union of failing to bargain in good faith.

The court rulings were on four separate petitions, two against the NLRB by the American Newspaper Publishers Association and the Printing Industry of America, Inc., and two by the NLRB against the ITU and the Chicago local.

The publishers groups charged in 1947 the unions were attempting to continue closed shop conditions in new contracts in violation of the Taft-Hartley law. The strike against the five dailies started after the publishers refused to grant pay increases to printers without a contract.

The strike ended with the printers accepting a \$10 weekly pay boost and the unions agreeing to abide by the Taft-Hartley law.

Poison Ivy Cure Wrong

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Gillette D-Iowa said Friday the Army had treated his son, Mark Gillette, 21, "for poison ivy when actually he was suffering from scarlet fever."

Gillette said the mistaken diagnosis was made in October at the Army Training Center at Camp Pickett, Va., and he was assured later by Army medical leaders that what he termed medical incompetence there would be corrected.

Mark Gillette was inducted to March under Selective Service at Camp Meade, Md., and sent to Camp Pickett for six weeks basic infantry training, his father told a reporter.

"He came home on a weekend pass and was so seriously ill that I had to carry him into the house," the senator said. "We called a civilian doctor and he said Mark had an advanced case of scarlet fever."

Murder Sentence To Be Reviewed

SALEM (AP)—The State Supreme Court announced Friday it would hear arguments January 9 in the appeal of Mrs. Sigurd Hansen, Corvallis, who was sentenced to life in the state penitentiary for the first degree murder of her husband.

Mrs. Hansen was convicted of crushing her husband to death with their automobile in the family garage.

Her attorneys contend it was accidental, and that there was no evidence to justify her conviction.

Or.-Wash. Sign Defense Compact

OLYMPIA (AP)—An Interstate Civil Defense Compact, which provides for mutual aid between Washington and Oregon in the event of a disaster, was signed by Governor Langlie Wednesday. It has already been signed by Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon.

The agreement provides for the exchange of emergency supplies, rescue equipment and personnel and establishes an operational basis for coordination of the two state's civil defense organizations.

California May Get Budget Surplus

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—A state treasury surplus that might go higher than 100 million dollars by June 30 was foreseen today by Controller Thomas H. Kuchel.

The surplus in the new general fund, Kuchel told a reporter, "May well exceed 128 million dollars" when the current bookkeeping year ends, and "this figure might be increased by an additional 25 million."

There have been big gains in tax revenues the past six months.

Four Year Old Dies Of Cancer

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—Four year old Dean Ault, blind because of cancer, died of the disease in a hospital here Thursday night.

The boy had been home from the hospital for Christmas and "knew Santa Claus was coming, but that was about all," his father Jack L. Ault, 34, said.

Dean was returned to the hospital Thursday when his condition became critical.
