Mr. and Mrs. Moore spent the Thanksgiving holidays with their daughters and families, and two young grandsons Richard and David Shoup.

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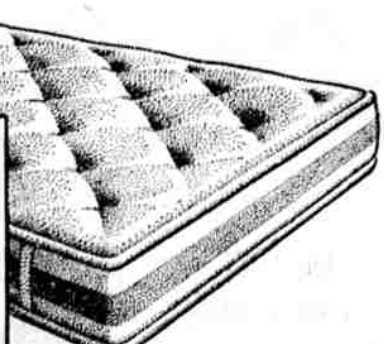
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
