MRS. GOELLER RESIGNS FROM LIBRARY BOARD

It was with deep regret that the resignation of Mrs. Alice Goeller from the board of the city library was accepted by Mayor Robert Thompson and the city council at a meeting this week.

Mrs. Goeller, who came to Klamath Falls with her family from Kansas in 1891 was a charter member of the library club. She was appointed a member of the building committee by the late Mayor Fred R. Goddard in 1925 and later became secretary-treasurer of the managing board when the building was completed. She has held that position until her resignation.

Other members of the original board were E. M. Bubb, J. G. Bermond, Mrs. Jack Kimball, Mrs. I. M. Worden.

Mrs. Goeller recalls many interesting incidents in connection with the struggles of the board to complete the building. The board was

helped by the consistent efforts of Enola Hawkins, librarian for many years.

Mrs. Goeller can count on the fingers of one hand the meetings missed in those early years and holds an enviable record of faithfulness, loyalty, and interest in this project that has brought happiness to so many Klamath Falls residents. Year after year she has served with only one thought, "a better library."

She has been active also in other community affairs through the years, including work for the Red Cross in both World Wars. She is a member of the Rebekah lodge, a charter member of the Art and Needlework Club.

She is recuperating from a recent illness of several months.

She is the mother of two sons, Harry and Fred Goeller, Klamath Falls and of two daughters, Mrs. Roy (Hazel) Orem and Mrs. Ralph (Barbara) Sowers, Portland.

THE BRIDE COOKS SUPPER Poached Fish Fillets with Curry Sauce Steamed Rice Major Gray's Chutney Cherry and Grapefruit Compote Diced Carrots and Celery Bread and Butter Beverage

CHERRY AND GRAPEFRUIT COMPOTE

Ingredients: One 8-ounce can dark sweet cherries (packed in syrup), one 8-ounce can grapefruit sections (packed in syrup) 2 tablespoons sugar, brandy flavoring. Method: Drain syrup from cherries and grapefruit into small sauce pan. (There will be about 1 cup syrup.) Add sugar. Bring to a boil quickly, stirring until sugar is dissolved; boil gently until syrup is reduced to about 1/2 cup—10 to 15 minutes. Stir in brandy flavoring to taste. Arrange cherries and grapefruit in serving dish or in individual dishes and pour syrup over, making sure some of it goes over grapefruit sections to color them pink. Chill. Makes 3 servings.

PECAN REFRIGERATOR SLICES Ingredients: 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup vitaminized margarine, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 egg, 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans. Method: Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream margarine, brown sugar, and vanilla. Beat in egg. Stir sifted ingredients and pecans into creamed mixture. Shape dough into long rolls about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap rolls in waxed paper and chill thoroughly. Cut in thin slices and bake on greased sheet in 400 F. oven for 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen cookies.

SUNDAY NIGHT SUPPER

Welsh Rabbit on Toast Peach Cranberry Ring Beverage

PEACH CRANBERRY RING

Ingredients: 2 cups cranberries, 1 medium-sized orange, 1 cup sugar, 8 canned cling peach halves, 1 package raspberry-flavored gelatin, 1 cup syrup from peaches, 1/4 cup chopped celery, salad greens. Method: Rinse cranberries and put through food chopper using medium knife. Cut orange into quarters (rind included) remove any seeds, and put through food chopper. Mix with cranberries and sugar. Allow to stand about 1 hour. Drain peach halves. Dissolve gelatin in heated peach syrup. Blend in

cranberry-orange mixture. Cool to consistency of unbeatened egg white. Arrange drained peach halves in bottom of 8-inch ring mold. Fold celery into gelatin mixture, and pour over peaches. Chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens to serve. Makes 8 servings.
