States To Talk Fees

SALEM (AP) — Oregon, Washington and Idaho motor vehicle authorities will meet soon in an effort to extend the truck reciprocity agreement, Assistant Secretary of State William E. Healy said Monday.

Healy said that in the meantime, the truck reciprocity agreement, under which the states don't tax each other's trucks, will be continued until January 15.

Healy said the agreement to try to continue the reciprocity was made Monday in telephone conversations between Gov. Len Jordan of Idaho, J. D. Mcdougall, Assistant Director of Licenses in Washington, and Healy.

Governor Jordan will fix the time and place for the conference, Healy said.

Idaho authorities served notice several weeks ago that Idaho is cancelling the agreement January 1 because a new state law forbids such agreements.

This would mean that other states would levy their license and other fees against Idaho trucks, and that Idaho would similarly tax the trucks of the other states. Healy said he believes that reciprocity can be continued even under the new Idaho law.

Power Curb To Continue

SEATTLE (AP) — The Defense Electric Power Administration order curtailing power in the Pacific Northwest will continue until at least Jan. 10.

The order was to have ended at midnight Monday.

James P. Fairman, DEPA administrator notified the Northwest Utilities Conference Monday, however, the order will remain in effect until the group's operating committee holds its scheduled Jan. 9-10 meeting.

The DEPA recently announced it would cancel the power curtailment order due to improved water conditions in the Northwest.

Portland On Growing Side

PORTLAND (AP) — There were 41,000 fewer registered voters in Portland at the end of 1951 than during the previous year. But the city grew in other ways.

Here are some measurements: Power customers—Increase of 4,604 for Portland General Electric and about 100 for Pacific Power and Light.

Telephones—Increase of 6,608 for a total of 210,520.

School enrollment—Increase of 3,000 for a total of 45,000.

Water meters—Increase of 26,000 for a total of 393,179.

Elections Registrar James Gleason said the reason for the drop in registrations was that 1951 was an off-year for elections.

1951 Hunting Accidents Low

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's hunting accident record during 1951 was one of the lowest in recent years, the State Game Commission reports.

Three persons were killed and 13 wounded, the commission said. Nine accidents involved deer hunters, one an elk hunter and one a waterfowl hunter.

DEATHS

Those killed were: Marvin G. Sunderland, Springfield, Sept. 30, mistaken for a deer in the Fall Creek area east of Eugene.

Robert Moore, Madras, Oct. 6, hit by a bullet accidentally discharged from a companion's gun in the Deschutes National Forest.

Brad Tillotson, Ontario, Oct. 19, killed when his own gun accidentally discharged.

BREAKDOWN

The commission said there had been 100 hunting accidents in the past six years. Of these, 21 percent were mishaps in which a man was mistaken for game, 25 suffered self-inflicted wounds and the other 50 percent were shot in general accidents.

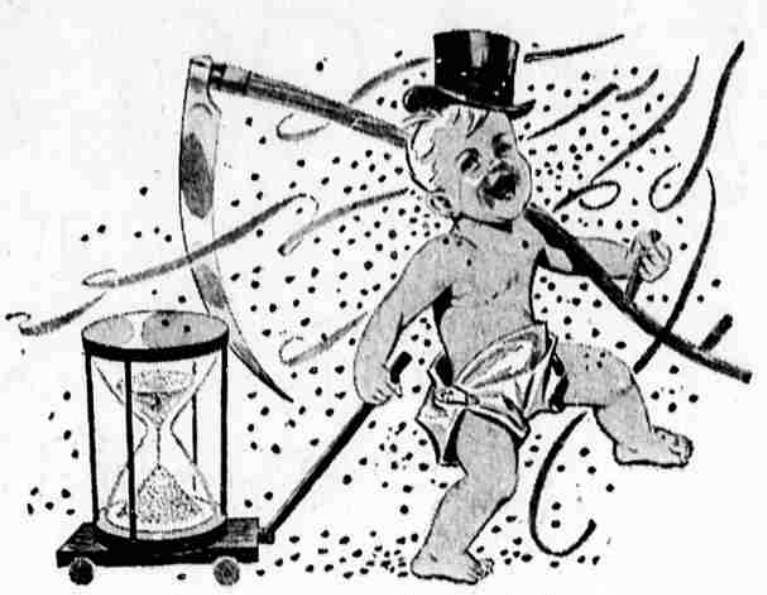
The greatest number of fatalities occurred in 1949 when 10 were killed.

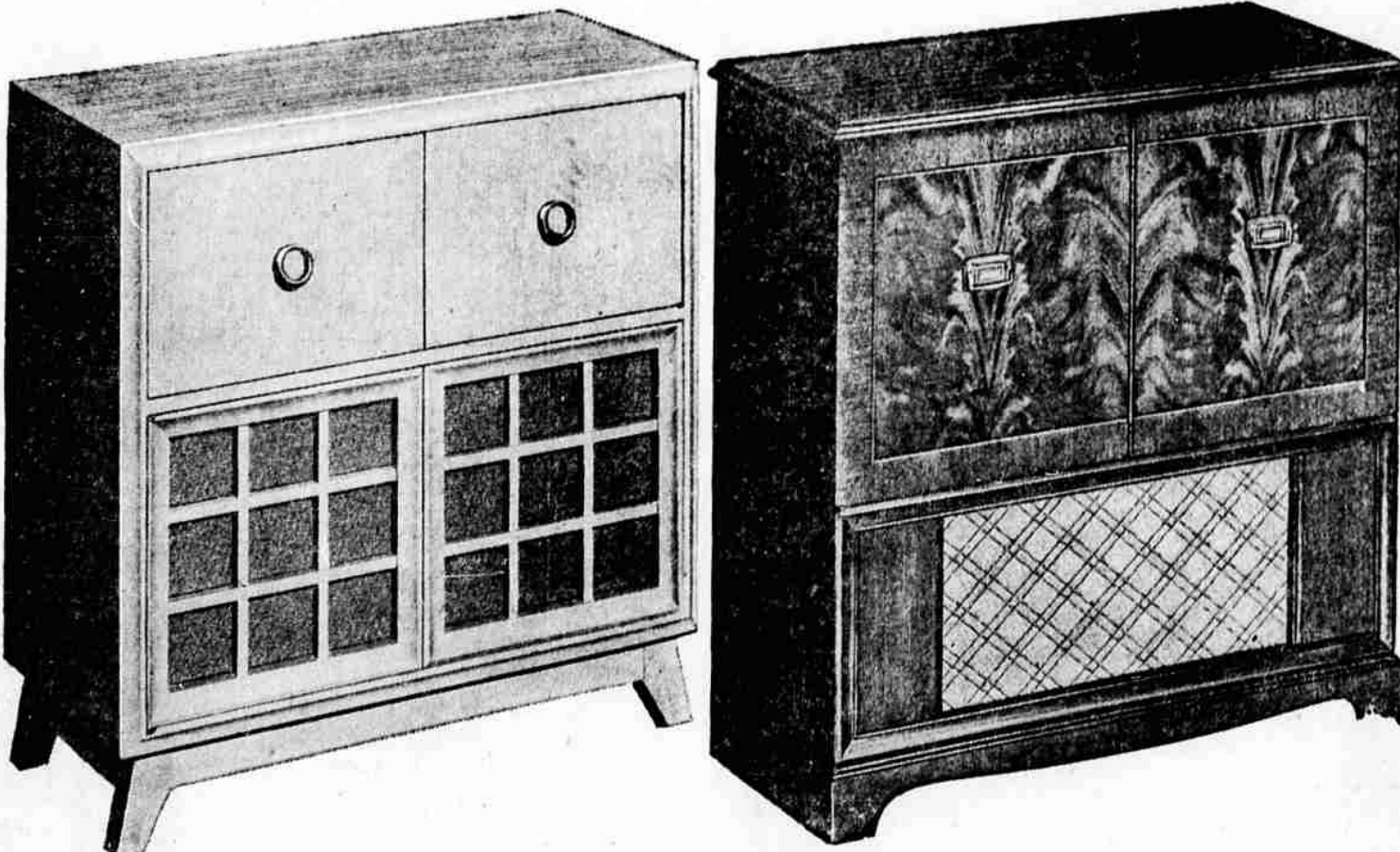
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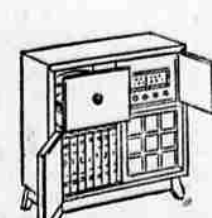
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
