WASHINGTON M — Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D. Tex.) stirred up a ruckus that figuratively set the palm fronds waving Wednesday over the question of training Army recruits in Hawaii.

Johnson, chairman of the Senate Preparedness Investigating Committee, said it was a waste of taxpayers' money to send the recruits all the way to Hawaii, especially if they were due for service later in Europe.

Joseph R. Farrington, Hawaii's delegate to Congress, declared the people of Hawaii will "fight to the limit" any attempt to cut down training facilities on the sunwashed islands.

Secretary of the Army Pace said he would think it over.

The Army had informed senators that Hawaii provided "terrain features and climatic conditions that are ideal for training process."

Moreover Army spokesmen told a reporter that a regiment trained in Hawaii consisted largely of natives and moved to Korea shortly after the war started there.

A replacement regiment was recruited in the island and filled up with volunteers and later inductees from the states.

They said no new facilities had been constructed but it was thought wise to use those available and to maintain some defenses in Hawaii.


