Food Output Falls Behind

ROME (AP)—The sixth world conference of the Food and Agriculture Organization found that world output "is steadily falling behind the increase in population, and the world has less food per person than before the war when more than half the world suffered from malnutrition."
The report said it was "convinced that the progress that can be achieved in the years immediately ahead will be insufficient to change this situation radically."
And it concluded that "there is little hope of achieving by 1960 the levels of production... considered necessary for a minimum program of sound nutrition throughout the world."

Whoops --- Pay Tax Now

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn. (AP)—County Treasurer Alex Enzman was dumfounded when George J. Fidler walked in and said he wanted to pay his real estate taxes—the tax bill which wasn't due until next year.
Enzman has been county treasurer 21 years and this was the first time, he said, that anyone paid his taxes in advance.
Fidler paid \$33.59 on 120 acres of partly cleared land. He explained to the fact it's a good idea to pay axes early.

Hormones Fix Lemon's Life

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—The use of hormone sprays developed by University of California scientists may have increased the life of lemons after they have reached the storage house by as much as 50 percent.
The effect, according to Dr. Louis C. Ericson, assistant plant physiologist, is to keep the stem end, or button, of the lemon alive and green and prevent internal changes which accompany aging of the fruit. Thus the lemons are less susceptible to certain rotting fungi.
Although icebergs occur throughout the year the greatest concentration in the shipping lanes of the lanes of the Atlantic usually occurs from March through June.

UC Studies Population

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The University of California reports "very promising" progress in attempts to control the trichinella and rat tapeworm parasites.
Efforts are being concentrated on finding a way in which the parasites energy-building activities differ from those of the host. At this point the parasite could be attacked and destroyed.
The trichinella, which causes a muscular disease known as trichinosis, is said to be giving discomfort to some 21 million Americans. Rat tapeworm is sometimes found in man but more often in the intestinal tract of rats.

Sleepy Eye Herd Grows

SLEEPY EYE, Minn. (AP)—Farmer Edwin Tauer's herd of cattle is growing rapidly.
He has three sets of twins in the herd. And the six animals all put in their appearance within a one-month period.
"When the third set arrived I thought I might be seeing double," Tauer said.
