

Watch Your Post Holiday Budget With Filling Dishes

As winter sets in, entertaining becomes more and more the rule—and many budget minded brows grow deeper furrows searching for glamorous company fare. Hamburg-

ger, even in new shapes and guises is becoming run-of-the-mill. Why not serve a moderate price meat with rice, and in a really different curry sauce—rich and full flavored. Makes a little veal go a long way, too. This curry, flavored with onions, celery, apples and sundry spices is an old-world treat welcome to American palates. Iron-rich New Orleans molasses is the secret of the sauce.

VEAL CURRY

2½ pounds boned, cut up veal
3 medium onions, minced
6 stalks celery, minced
2 apples, minced
6 tablespoons shortening
4 cups meat stock
2 tablespoons curry powder
2 teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ teaspoon ginger
Few drops tobacco
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
½ cup New Orleans molasses
2 egg yolks, well beaten
Hot boiled rice

Saute veal, onions, celery and apples in shortening until light brown. Add meat stock. Blend together curry powder, salt, pepper, ginger and a little meat stock. Add with molasses to meat mixture; cover. Cook 30 minutes or until tender. Season rice with butter, salt and pepper and pack into ring mold. Turn out. Just before serving stir a little hot curry gravy into egg yolks. Stir into meat and vegetable mixture, stirring constantly. Pour into rice ring. Makes 8 servings. With the curry serve as many of these condiments as desired: chutney, shredded fresh coconut, peanuts, sieved hard-cooked egg yolks and whites, chopped crisp bacon or finely diced orange rind.

Note: 4 cups leftover cooked veal may be used; reduce cooking time to 20 minutes. Canned bouillon or bouillon cubes with water may be used for meat stock.

Wax Leather For Service, Long Wear

If Santa brought you a calfskin purse or belt for Christmas, wax your treasure immediately to keep it looking new and insure its wear, suggests Miss Murie Scales, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college.

Either a neutral shoe polish or paste floor wax can be used. Apply a thin coat and rub it in thoroughly with a straight rather than circular motion. Then buff with a soft cloth to develop the sheen.

The specialist recommends applying two coats of wax to the leather article the first time, followed by re-waxing about once a month, depending on how often used.

This treatment prevents water spots and minor scratches, keeps the leather from cracking, and generally prolongs its life.

GLAMOUR TOPPING

Give a vanilla cream pie, made with packaged pudding mix, this glamorous topping. Cover the pie with drained sweetened cooked dried apricots. Then spread with a glaze made by combining and cooking until clear ½ cup apricot cooking liquid, ¼ cup granulated sugar and 1 tablespoon cornstarch.
