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Barristers Hit Indian Service Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Bar Association Friday criticized proposed Interior Department restrictions on contracts between Indian Tribes and their attorneys.

Rufus G. Poole, chairman of a special committee which studied the proposed regulations, said the Association is shocked by the extent to which the commission of Indian affairs proposes to "intrude into the relationship between the Indian client and his attorney."

Poole presented the Bar Association's views to Secretary of the Interior Chapman on the second day of a hearing into the attorney contract dispute. Chapman, who must decide whether the proposed regulations will be put into effect, has said he will make his decision as soon as thorough study of the evidence at the hearing will permit.

Dog Consistent In Biting List

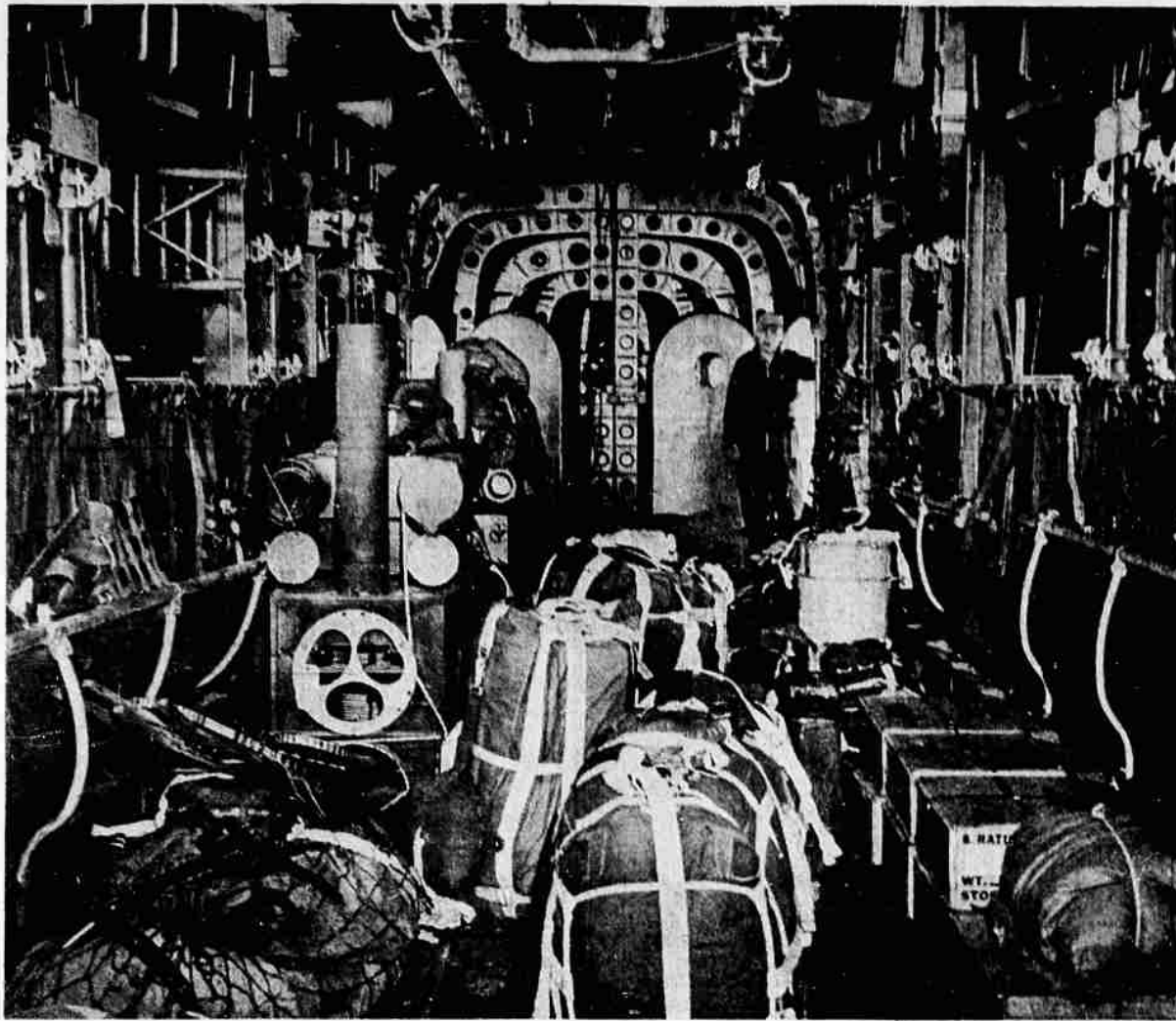
ATLANTA (AP) — Annette Evans, 15, told police she was walking along the street Thursday when a big dog ran from a yard and bit her on the left leg.

Sgt. W. D. Johnson went to investigate.

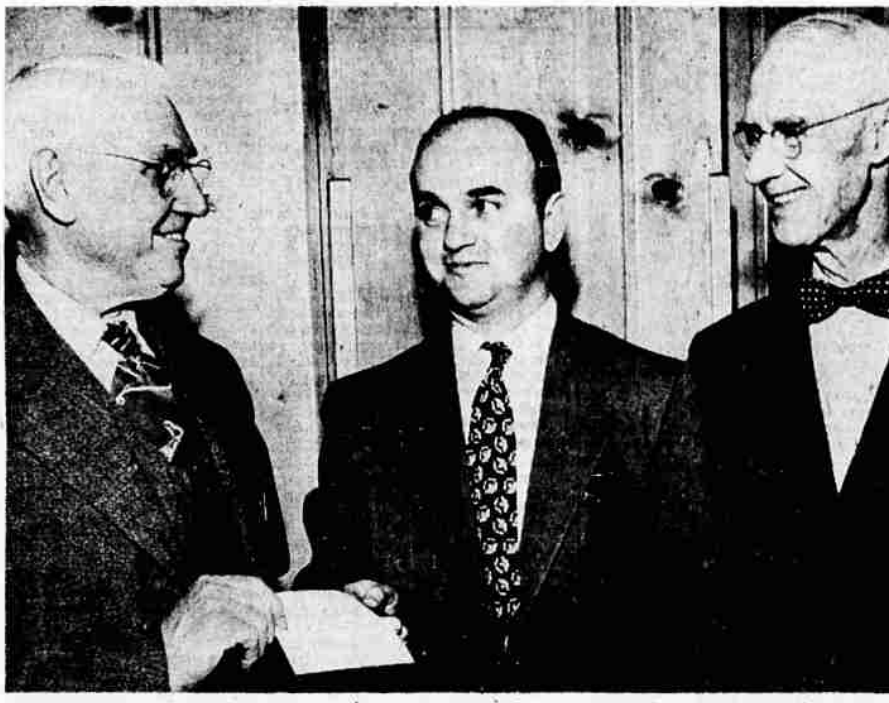
Wool! A big German Shepherd dashed out and bit him—also on the left leg.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Early Oregon architecture currently is being spotlighted in the photographic gallery of the American Institute of Architects.

The pictures, taken by Walter Boychuck, were presented to the Institute's library by Glenn Stanton of Portland, Institute president.

Crime Picture For County During 1951 Shows About Same Level As In Past

When it comes time to summing up a year of crime in Klamath County there is hardly ever a dearth of material. Last year was no exception to that rule.

The difficult part is separating the news from the chaff.

Good indication of the full 1951 picture of crime was receipt at the Oregon State Prison in Salem, O., of inmates from Klamath County.

It exceeds the 49 sent up in 1949 and the 47 sentenced in 1950.

A good indication of a probable reason for crime—the possibility of someone from someone for nothing—was revealed in 1951 statistics that 70 percent of convictions resulted on the crimes of robbery, burglary, larceny, forgery and writing bad checks.

The year began in early with sentencing of Cleo Parks to 25 and 10 years for kidnaping and assault with a dangerous weapon.

He came up with sentencing of six teenage youths to terms of 10 years each for robbery.

Four days after 1950 took a powder, while McCain was sentenced in Siskiyou county for the Oct. 30, 1950 killing of Mrs. Velsie Ainsworth at the Westside grocery store.

Then later on in 1951, in March, a rash of burglaries and safecrackings plagued the City Police force.

Perhaps the biggest crime story of the year, bringing into play the investigating force of the Sheriff's office, State Police, the FBI and Southern Pacific special agents, occurred early in May. It was the sabotage wrecking of an SP freight train at Malone siding. The wreck at this writing was still unexplained, being investigated.

More safecrackings followed in July, those of the Labor Temple and attempt at the telephone company office within a few hours of each other.

August was its usual quiet self as far as crime was concerned.

But September brought a reported kidnaping attempt of a Medford man from a motel here by two St. Paul, Minn. youths he had picked up as hitchhikers. The youths were later acquitted in a second July trial in Sacramento.

Liquor and juveniles came to the fore in October when juvenile authorities broke up a drinking and dancing party involving a group of junior high and high school students on a weekend. A 21-year-old millworker was sentenced to 60 days in District Court for getting beer for the teenagers, but was later probationed by the court and served only a couple of weeks of work.

Several days later an 18-year-old youth was arrested for the same crime, but never came to trial on the charge. The case was continued in District Court and the youth later convicted of a felony.

About the same time in October a "good-looking" gunman robbed two women clerks at the Valley hotel of \$39.

Early in November Klamath Amusement Co. was robbed of \$200 and late in the month two Indian Service officers at Chiloquin were wounded by a pistol packing Indian, LeRoy Alvin Hicks. He faces indictment by a Federal grand jury in Portland.

December opened up with robbery of Oregon Food Store No. 2, Dec. 10 of \$476. A suspect, Thomas Patrick Schram, 28, was arrested the same night and still sits in the county jail awaiting prosecution on an armed robbery charge and a forgery count.

As seasonal in December as Christmas, forgery and bad check crimes flourished along with shoplifting. The season and the crimes seem to go together.

So it goes from month to month. And when it comes to writing a summation of 1951's crime activities in Klamath County, the material at hand will no doubt be just as plentiful.

Salvage Log Auction Held

EUGENE (AP) — The first of some 94,000 board feet of salvageable timber from the Helie Creek forest first of last June was auctioned last week by the Willamette National Forest.

The 1,650,000 board feet bid in by Alum Bros., Eugene, was one of several parcels auctioned in a year-end sale that brought bids totaling \$646,061. Altogether, about 30,000,000 board feet of timber, mostly in areas which haven't been burned, went on the block.

Rex Wakefield, timber sales officer for the forest, said the Helie Creek parcel was the first of three or four offerings resulting from the 3000-acre fire. The other timber will be sold in February.

The fire felled an estimated 120,000,000 board feet, Wakefield said. The salvageable 94,000,000 has an estimated value of \$1,500,000.
