Congress To Buckle Down On Tuesday

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 82nd Congress starts its election-year session Tuesday, with politics likely to weigh heavily in all major sessions. The next six months are expected to bring tough decisions, one way or the other, on such major matters as universal military training, foreign military and economic aid, economic controls at home, and defense spending. Leaders are hopeful the session can wind up in time for the July political conventions so members can go home afterward for the fall campaigns. All House seats will be at stake in the November voting. So will 32 Senate seats, as well as the Presidency and the vice-Presidency. President Truman will blueprint his legislative program in his State of the Union message Wednesday. The President is expected to renew his request for civil rights legislation, compulsory health insurance, and tougher wage, price and rent controls. He may ask for more taxes. Investigations, providing heavy ammunition for political campaigns, will constitute a major legislative activity. Committee members will delve into charges of graft in high places, scandals in tax law enforcement, waste of public money, and Communism. Inquiries started last year and to be continued this year already have provided Republicans with campaign slogans dealing with bank coats and home freezers to legislators at the Democratic administration.

Methodist Church Missions Planned

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Methodist Church announced Sunday 13 metropolitan and state-wide evangelistic missions. In addition, special evangelistic campaigns will be held in Alaska March 13-27, Bishop Ralph S. Cushman, president of the Methodist board of Evangelism, said. The schedule of missions to be held in this country includes March 8-30, Portland, Ore., area.

I discovered that beneath that shapely and well-composed exterior lurks a shrinking violet. Ava was talking about her recent trip to England, where she met members of the royal family. She remarked that Princess Elizabeth was very shy, "just like me." Ava shy? "Absolutely," she replied. "People frighten me. You should see me in a crowd; I get terrified. Why, if I had to do all the things that Princess Elizabeth does, it would kill me." If she is so shy, how did she get in the acting business? she replied, "I've never been able to figure it out myself. I'm completely miscast. I'm much better equipped for having babies." Was this a hint? Columnists have already been rumormongering that Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sinatra will be welcoming the star. "No, it's not true yet," she replied, adding "unfortunately." She remarked that she would like to have two or three children. Ava indeed appears to be of the domestic type. She told of spending a whole day scrubbing the kitchen of the Sinatras' Palm Springs manse. She also does much of the cooking for her new husband and glowed with a report of her first try at Italian spaghetti. "Frank told me how to do it," she said. "It has to be made very carefully and it cooks two hours. I must admit that mine tasted wonderful." Such dishes may restore needed poundage to Ava, who is 10 pounds underweight at the latest reading (although nothing seems wrong with her well-known proportions). She has been trying to gain back the weight while vacationing at Palm Springs and came in town only for the premiere of her picture, "Pandora and the Flying Dutchman." Much of the weight was lost on the Sinatras' trip to Europe, during which they covered 16,000 miles in seven days. Along with other performers, they went to England to appear at a benefit under the sponsorship of the Duke of Edinburgh. Ava was enthusiastic about him. "He's the most charming man I ever met," she remarked. "It's no wonder the English people are crazy about him. He has a tremendous charm and wit and kept us entertained for hours. Gangsters Facing New Crackdown

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. district attorneys throughout the nation mapped plans Monday for the convening of special grand juries to investigate "racketeers, gangsters and organized crime." Attorney General McGrath sent out orders over the week-end calling the special grand juries in each of the 93 Federal judicial districts "as soon as possible." McGrath specifically directed that underworld figures be brought in for questioning. The attorney general said in a letter to the district attorneys that much of the information developed "probably will not establish the commission of specific federal offenses." This means evidence to send wrongdoers to jail. Nevertheless, he wrote, "this type of information, if obtained from the proper sources and later adequately evaluated, will be of great benefit to the Justice Department for general law enforcement purposes." Some observers viewed McGrath's move as another step by the administration to take political criticism away from its critics. It came at a time when some critics were saying McGrath has not been vigorous enough in dealing with corruption in government.

Smith Takes Over IDS Post Here

Wesley M. Smith, formerly operator of the Golden Creme Donut Shop, here, has been appointed as co-zone manager of Klamath county for Investors Diversified Services, Inc. It was announced by William B. Boscow of Eugene, divisional manager. Smith will be associated with Martin Putnam, representative for the firm here since 1946. He has recently been released from the armed services. The Investors Group formerly was known as Investors Syndicate.

Fire In Church Quickly Squelched

DALLAS, Ore. (AP) — A fire in the Methodist Church here failed to halt Sunday morning services. The blaze broke out in a primary room two hours before Sunday school classes started. Firemen said it apparently originated from rummage sale clothing stacked near a furnace. The blaze was confined to the basement, caused an estimated \$3,000 damage. Classes and services were held upstairs as scheduled.

Former Oregon Professor Dies

BURLINGAME, Calif. (AP) — Funeral services for Frank Short, 54, former professor at the school of journalism at the University of Oregon, were held here Monday. He died at his home in nearby Millbrae Friday night. Short, who retired in 1943, is survived by his widow, a son and a daughter. Except in the mountainous west and southwest, oil-rich Saudi Arabia's annual rainfall amounts to only about 3 inches.

He plans to show the magnitude of problems brought on by negative emotions, and will point the way to sane and constructive means of sublimating destructive attitudes which cause illness, inefficiency, social disharmony, crippled lives and broken homes. Zaffiro is American born, but was educated in Canada. His practical philosophy, according to Knife and Fork officers, helps individuals to better understand themselves and their neighbors. Search For Plane Here Called Off

Organized search for an Air Force transport plane with eight men aboard, missing since Dec. 20, was called off here late yesterday. Planes and men of the Fourth Rescue Squadron, McChord Air Force Base, were called back to their Tacoma base. The team of seven big planes and 44 men was believed to have been the largest Air Force search and rescue team ever set up for a Northwest search. The missing plane, a C-47, was last heard from when it made a routine radio check with Municipal Airport here at 4:17 p.m., Dec. 20. The plane reported it was flying southward at 10,000 feet and gave no hint of trouble. The big ship, carrying a crew of three and five service men termed aerial hitchhikers, was en route from Spokane to Travis Field in the San Francisco Bay area. Planes of the Fourth Rescue Squadron instituted a search here Dec. 27, aided by the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit. The base set up at Municipal Airport included facilities for aerial searching and ground rescue. Capt. Ray Costello, Redlands, Calif., was in command. Numerous clues were checked out as far as possible but no trace of the plane was found. Bad weather hampered aerial searches for several days. One search base was still functioning today. A piece of twisted metal found in the Peagher River canyon near Oroville, Calif., yesterday, was seen as a possible clue. An Air Force search team that has been operating out of Red Bluff was immediately shifted to Oroville.

His Only Mistake Was In Outliving His Money, So Says Once-Wealthy Planter

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — My one mistake was that I outlived my money. That's how 87-year old Thomas Linton McCullough sums up his fate which tumbled him from a once-wealthy cotton planter to a broke nonagenarian living in a boarding house on a \$50-a-month old age pension. Before he retired 22 years ago, McCullough built up a fabulous fortune which kept the wolf away from his door until six months ago. That's when the money ran out. McCullough, still an erect figure with a flowing white beard, explains it this way: "Both my mother and father died at 72 and I reckoned I couldn't exceed this by more than eight years." So, at the age of 75, he retired with what he thought was enough money in the bank to last him the rest of his life. At 80, McCullough revealed, he bought an airplane for "one last fling" across the continent, into Mexico and South America. "I figured three or four more years would take me out." But when he returned three years later, he was still going strong. As the years rolled on past the 80, 85 and 90-year marks, the "last fling" continued and so did McCullough. His money gave out first. But there's one thing you can bet on, McCullough says with a glint in his eye. That one mistake of living too long "is an error 'I'm going to go on making just as long as I can."
