Vets Mail Bag

Eligible disabled veterans who apply for automobiles or other conveyances under a law passed by the last session of Congress, will have to wait for their cars until Congress reconvenes and can appropriate funds to administer the act, according to the Veterans Administration.

The VA says that since the new law does not contain an appropriation of funds for the cars, it will have to ask Congress for a special appropriation when it reconvenes. Meanwhile, the VA is accepting applications under the new law and adjudicating them. All completed applications will be held until money has been provided.

The new act (Public Law 187, applies to eligible disabled veterans of World War II and those who served in the armed forces on and after June 27, 1950, the start of the Korean campaign.

To be eligible for automobiles, or other conveyances, these veterans must be entitled to compensation for any of the following service-connected disabilities:

1. Loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both feet.
2. Loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both hands.
3. Complete loss of sight in both eyes or permanent impairment of vision of both eyes to the degree as to constitute visual blindness.

Under the law, the VA is authorized to pay up to \$1,600 toward the purchase price of an automobile, including special equipment. No payment will be made by the government for repair, maintenance or replacement, and no veteran is entitled to more than one automobile or conveyance.

The law stipulates that an otherwise eligible veteran must have a driver's license to qualify for an automobile, but that if the veteran cannot qualify for a driver's license he will not be deprived of this benefit providing he has another person operate the car for him. Veterans may apply for this benefit within three years from the effective date of the new law, October 20, 1951, or three years from the date of their discharge or release from active service if they are not discharged or released until on or after the effective date of

the law.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Q. What requirements does a recently-discharged veteran have to meet to take out the new type of non-convertible government term insurance?

A. He must have been ordered to active duty for 31 days or more; served since June 27, 1950, and been released from active service.

Cargo Taken From Gutted Freighter

PORTLAND (AP)—Workmen began removing the cargo of the fire-damaged Danish Ship Erria here Monday.

The vessel was towed here Sunday from Astoria where it burned last month with the loss of 11 lives.

Agents for the East Asiatic Line, owners of the ship, said temporary repairs would be made here so it could sail back to Denmark under its own power. Final repairs will be made there.

PENDLETON, Ore. (AP)—Water rates will increase here Feb. 1 to meet an estimated annual \$12,000 water department deficit.

City Manager Ray Betch said the new monthly minimum rate of \$1.10 still is the lowest of any comparable community in the Pacific Northwest.
