Japs Lay Off **Fishing Right**

WASHINGTON ® — Japan has become one of the first nations—
if not the first— to refrain from exercising its legal right to fisheries on the high seas, Milton C. James, assistant director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said

Japan made the concession at the recently completed international conference with the United States and Ganada, during which fisheries of the North Pacific were discussed

James, who spent seven

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in Tokyo helping to draft the program, said Japan agreed to abstain from fishing for halibut, herring or salmon in areas off the coast of North America where commercial fishing has been or could be conducted.

Under international law, all nations have equal rights to the fisheries on the high seas.

James said, however, that in the new agreement Japan recognizes that the fisheries specified are carefully managed, at considerable expense to the United States and Canada, and that entry of another nation into the field could wreck the conservation program.

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
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
