He said some teams were having trouble signing players. The league finished its 1951 season with five teams after California's Maryaville, Pittsburg and Willows dropped out.

WASHINGTON IB — College sports as they now are conducted would be completely changed under a far-reaching plan proposed by 10 college presidents studying intercollegiate athletics.

The presidents came up with a code that would rule out spring football practice, forbid post season games and wipe out athletic scholarships.

As expected, it quickly drew criticism. President Hugh C. Willett of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. NCAA, in Cincinnati described the proposal as "a little premature."
