MADE WITH **Crater Lake COTTAGE CHEESE**



SHRIMP AND CRATER LAKE COTTAGE CHEESE LOAF

1 1/2 cups uncooked macaroni	1 tsp. salt
2 qt. boiling water	1/8 tsp. pepper
2 tbsps. minced onion	1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 tbsps. minced green pepper	2 eggs, beaten
1 cup tomato juice	1 cup cottage cheese
	1 small can shrimp, cleaned and chopped

Cook macaroni in boiling water until tender, as labels direct. Drain and rinse with warm water. Heat oven to 325 degrees. Sauté onions and peppers in butter until tender.

To the tomato juice, add onion mixture, salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce and eggs; mix well. Add shrimp, cottage cheese and macaroni; mix. Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven until firm to touch. Remove; let stand five minutes before unloading. Serve hot with tomato or creole sauce. Makes six servings.

No Tax Up Seen Coming

WASHINGTON (P)—Key congressional leaders agreed Wednesday there will be no general federal tax increases this year—even if President Truman asks them.

Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) put the Senate Republican Policy Committee unanimously on record against any more tax boosts late Tuesday.

"We decided that we should take a position against any further increase in taxes in 1952," Taft told reporters. He said Republicans all so would fight to slash government spending.

Taft said federal, state and local taxes now take "over 30 per cent of the national income" and that is about the limit even in an emergency.

Earlier Tuesday House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) told newsmen he "doubts" that Congress will pass any tax increase this election year.

Hayden Speaks At Merrill Club

Crater Snow Nears Record

Unusual weather has brought abnormal snowfall to Crater Lake National Park, according to Chief Ranger Lou Hallock, and snow depth there may exceed all records if it continues at the present rate.

At the end of December, the ranger reported, snowfall stood at 135 inches, greater than any previous year recorded other than 1951-52. Total snowfall for December (overall fall measured daily) was more than 179 inches; total fall from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31 was 323.5 inches. Average total fall for an entire winter is 622.5 inches.

Hallock noted that three snow-months are yet to come, but already more than 50 per cent of the average total has been reached.

The 44 per cent average water content snowpack offers a good reservoir for the coming season, Hallock said.

Property Tax Return Good

Approximately 85 per cent of the 1951-52 Klamath County property tax levy has been collected, as of Jan. 1, according to the tax office.

Collections from November to that date amounted to \$3,396,362.38, of a total to be collected of \$3,978,620.88.

Actually the percentage of collections is greater than 85 per cent of the potential of the property tax, since many payments have been made in full to take advantage of a 3 per cent discount.

HOULED FRUIT SALAD SUPREME

1 pkg. lemon or lime gelatin	1 cup Crater Lake cottage cheese
1 cup hot water	1/2 cup broken walnuts
1 cup heavy cream, whipped	1/2 cup marashino cherries
	1 cup crushed pineapple, well drained

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Chill until partially set. Fold in cottage cheese and whipped cream, walnuts, cherries and pineapple. Pour into 1 qt. salad mould, or refrigerator tray; chill until firm.

1/3 cup butter	1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup flour	2 tsp. single action bkg. powder
1/2 tsp. salt	1/2 cup Crater Lake cottage cheese

Cream butter and cheese until thoroughly blended. Sift flour, measure, and sift with sugar, baking powder and salt. Add this gradually to first mixture. Form into a loaf and chill over night. Slice thin, and place on slightly oiled baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven 10 minutes, or until brown.
