Butter, Egg Prices Show Slight Decline; Citrus Fruits, Lettuce Drop

Retail prices of butter, eggs, citrus fruits, celery and lettuce were lower in most stores this week.

Chickens cost a little more in many places but changes in meat and poultry items generally were irregular and well scattered.

Lighter shipments of snap beans, brussels sprouts, carrots, cucumbers, onions, peppers and squash made them a trifle more expensive at retail.

Butter and egg prices varied widely from store to store and city to city, as is frequently the case in an unsettled market.

Declines in lettuce at retail ranged from one to six cents a pound, and top grade eggs were off as much as eight cents in some places— with the possibility of even further cuts as storekeepers put both items high on their lists of advertised week-end specials to attract shoppers.

Butter climbed from around 6 cents a pound at New York in September to nearly \$1 a pound last week before prices turned downward. Some grocery stores were even above \$1.

Eggs have been easing sporadically ever since shortly after Thanksgiving Day, and now are slightly below the year-ago levels in many places.

Production is expected to be about 4 per cent larger through next spring than in the like months last year, so no sharp upturn price-wise is anticipated.

Heavier receipts of Florida oranges, grapefruit and tangerines sent their prices off sharply in

most markets this week and grapefruit was featured as an advertised bargain by many stores. California navel oranges were down less.

Pears, beets, cauliflower, and radishes also were slightly lower priced. And the Agriculture Department put killards kale, escarole, endive and spinach on the best-sellers list this week.

The Agriculture Department stressed beef, pork and pork products this week as most-plentiful foods for thrifty buying.

Food prices at the wholesale level dropped this week to the lowest average level since Nov. 14, 1950, according to the Dun & Bradstreet food index.

At \$6.61 it compared with \$6.64 last week and \$7.02 a year ago. The 1951 low was \$6.03 on Dec. 18. This index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use.

Montana Now In Spud Battle

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Mansfield (D-Mont.) Wednesday protested that new ceiling prices for potatoes discriminate against Montana growers.

He told a reporter he had written to the Office of Price Stabilization after receiving complaints from Montana farmers.

The new potato ceiling prices, announced last week, are to be effective January 19. They will provide for price rollbacks averaging from five to 10 per cent.

Mansfield quoted William Anderson, a grower at Deer Lodge, Mont., as saying that all potatoes sold prior to December 15 were sold at less than parity, and that growers must average approximately 100 per cent of parity over a period of years to continue in operation.
