Capitol Hill Spy Hunters Dig Into Background Of 'Protected' Publication

WASHINGTON (AP)—House spy hunters dug deeper Thursday into why the State Department gave protection to an American publication in Shanghai despite Chinese charges it was a Communist front.

A "mystery witness" identified only as M. L. Appelmann of Denver, Colo., was scheduled to appear before the un-American Activities Committee in its investigation of Max and Grace Granich.

The Granichs, who edited "Voice of China" in Shanghai in 1936-37 before being forced to suspend, are said to be living now at Wilmington, Vt. They have been summoned to appear next week.

They have denied they were Communist when asked by consular authorities.

The committee heard testimony Wednesday that the State Department intervened to protect "Voice of China" after Chinese authorities twice confiscated issues and U.S. consular authorities refused to go to Granich's aid.

A surprise witness was John Carter Vincent, now State Department representative at Tangiers, Morocco, who said he drafted instructions to protect the seizure.

Vincent is to appear next week before the Senate Internal Security Committee investigating the State Department. He has also come under fire in attacks by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) on State Department security risks.

Vincent testified he drafted the consular officials on the "purely legal grounds" that confiscation of Granich's paper was an "unwarranted invasion of American jurisdiction" over American property in the International Settlement of Shanghai.

Jernstedt Will Head Seed League

PORTLAND (AP)—L. R. Jernstedt, Sherwood, was elected president of the Oregon Seed Growers League Wednesday at the concluding session of the League's annual meeting.

Jernstedt succeeds J. F. Short, Reimond.

Tom Ruckman, Imbler, was named vice-president, and Rex Warren, Oregon State College Extension Farm Crops Specialist, was elected Secretary-Treasurer, succeeding E. K. Jackman.

Jackman, also an OSC crops specialist, had served as secretary since the League was organized 11 years ago. He declined another term.

Because of a nitrogen fertilizer shortage, Arthur S. King, OSC soil conservation specialist, advised farmer-seed producers to buy early.

The League endorsed a resolution by State Sen. Howard Belton's federal government to halt foreign seed imports at less than domestic supported prices.

A resolution favoring a 1952 ballot measure limiting state taxes on property to six mills was also passed.

Dimes Fund Boost Eyed

Siskiyou County received more financial aid from the national polio foundation than was collected in the county's March of Dimes campaign and a determined effort is being made this year to increase campaign collections.

In last year's Siskiyou drive, the March of Dimes received about \$8,700. Total bill for the county's polio cases amounted to over \$7,000 and the national foundation made up the difference.

This year, the Dimes March is being directed by Bud Kohn, Mount Shasta.

A major feature of this year's drive is a Dorris dance, Jan. 12, at the Red Barn, with music by the Oregon Hillbillies. The dance is being sponsored by the Dorris VFW and Auxiliary. Members of the two organizations are selling tickets house-to-house and tickets will also be on sale at the dance.

Japs To Survey Fishing Waters

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's fisheries board announced Thursday it plans to send a survey team into northern Pacific waters soon to inspect possible areas for obtaining salmon, trout, crab and fur seal.

Japan has reached an agreement on North Pacific fishing rights with the United States and Canada. When the pact is ratified the Japanese expect to resume fishing in the Aleutian, Bering and Okhotsk waters.
