Grains Fail To Hold Early Rally

CHICAGO (U) — An early rally in grains failed to hold on the board of trade Thursday. Toward the finish most contracts slipped below the previous close.

Gains ranged to around a cent at the start. Buying developed on minor export business and official confirmation of a very small Australian wheat supply. There never was any follow-through demand, however.

Wheat closed 3/4 lower to 1/2 higher, March \$2.59 1/2, corn 1/2-3/4 lower, March \$1.01 1/2, oats 1/2-3/4 lower, March 95-95 1/2, rye 1/2-1 lower, May \$2.11 1/2-2.12, soybeans 1 cent lower to 2 1/2 higher, January \$3.00 1/2-1/4, and lard unchanged to 15 cents a hundred pounds lower, January \$14.85.

Broad Buying Puts Market Figures Up

NEW YORK (U) — Broad buying lifted the stock market substantially Thursday in a general recovery movement from reverses suffered earlier this week.

There were many gains of between 2 and 3 points among leaders at the best, while a selected few issues pushed sharply beyond that. The great bulk of the gains of course ran from fractions to a little past a point.

Rising prices encouraged trading of an estimated 1,600,000 shares, the best volume in more than a month. The total yesterday came to 1,370,000 shares.
