Coach F. C. (Phog) Allen's Kansans received 22 first place votes and 790 points in the sixth weekly balloling of sports writers and sportscasters.

Illinois received 23 first place votes and is in the No. 2 spot with 773 points. Both of the leaders are unbeaten, Kansas having won 13, and Illinois 11 games.
