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**GIVE TOO LITTLE HEAT,
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JACOBY on Canasta

"Please settle a play problem for us," requests a Toledo correspondent.

"It was near the end of the hand, since the stock pile was down to about ten cards and our opponents were drawing for their cut. We had six kings and six aces on the table, and my partner had a deuce to add to one of these melds.

"The six kings were all natural cards, but the meld of queens consisted of four natural queens and two wild cards. Where should my partner add his deuce?"

"The deuce should be added to the meld of kings. This gives up the natural canasta, but greatly increases the chance of melding both canastas.

"No matter which way you meld the deuce, your chance to draw another wild card remains unchanged. The only difference in your chance to meld both canastas lies in the greater ease of drawing a queen rather than a king.

"There are only two kings out against you, but there are four queens. Hence you have twice as good a chance to draw a queen as to draw a king.

"If you add the deuce to the queens, you have two chances, (the two missing kings), to score an additional 500 points for the natural canasta.

"If you add the deuce to the kings, you have four chances, (the four queens), to score an additional 300 points for the mixed canasta.

"In the long run, for every 1000 points you might score in natural canastas, you will score 1200 points in mixed canastas.

"This is not the only argument in favor of adding the deuce to the kings. Your opponents probably hold some of the missing kings and queens. Since they are trying to meld out, those kings and queens are embarrassing cards.

"The opponents will be more relieved if you complete the canasta of queens than if you add the deuce to the kings.

"Once you complete a canasta, the opponents will be able to throw cards of that denomination without losing too much by it. Such a discard, under the official laws, will give away the discard pile, but that is seldom important in the late stages and in this sort of position.

Groucho Says Famous Trio Won't Team for TV Series

HOLLYWOOD—(NEA)—Hollywood on TV: Groucho Marx tells me that offers have been pouring in, but he won't be teaming up with madcap brothers Harpo and Chico for a TV comedy series designed to revive the sappy Marx antics.

The mad-eyed, sharp-tongued Groucho will roll along with "You Bet Your Life" and an occasional movie role because "this gives me all the work that I want to do," and that's enough," Groucho says. "You can only get increasingly stale. We realized that and struck out for ourselves. Maybe I should say we struck out."

Charges of hacking contestants to little pieces on his NBC-TV quiz show sends the Marx eyebrows higher than they went when a shapely blonde passed in his days as a stage wif.

Protested Groucho: "I don't insult people. I just get off a few truths. Hardly anybody in radio or TV speaks the truth. Fred Allen is one of the few who does."

No wonder Hollywood's gulping. More people see Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis for free on their TV shows than people who pay to see their movies.

McCarthy Row Gaining Heat

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Benton (D-Conn.) Thursday fought against reorganization of the Senate subcommittee investigating his move to have Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) ousted from the Senate.

Benton charged the reportedly imminent shakeup "would surely be regarded by tens of millions of Americans as an effort to 'stack the jury' for political purposes" and "would be construed as a 'whitewash'."

Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Me.) confirmed that she is slated to leave the rules subcommittee conducting the inquiry, but told a reporter it was at her request.

Sen. Hendrickson (R-N.J.) said he had heard he also was booked to be moved off the subcommittee and would not resist.

Sens. Welker (R-Idaho) and Dirksen (A-Ill.) new Rules Committee members, are reported slated to succeed Mrs. Smith and Hendrickson on the subcommittee.

McCarthy has protested that Mrs. Smith and Hendrickson should not participate in the study of Benton's charges against him. He contended they would be prejudiced because both concurred in an earlier report to the Senate denouncing McCarthy's tactics in the 1950 Maryland Senatorial election campaign.

Truman Defends Government Workers

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman says it is unfair to criticize all federal employes because "of the actions of a few."

"The overwhelming majority of our federal workers are devoted, hard-working, honest, loyal servants of the people," the President said. "They deserve our fullest recognition and support."

Mr. Truman's statement was issued Wednesday on the 49th anniversary of competitive civil service.

"Hot" Sweater Probe Opens

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government is going to try to punish people who have been peddling "flash fire" sweaters.

Chairman James M. Mead of the Federal Trade Commission said Wednesday agents have been sent to New York, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Providence, R. I., Chicago, Kansas City and Los Angeles to check on reports of "torch sweaters" being sold.

Mead said the agents will examine suspected garments to see if any federal laws have been violated.

Investigation so far, Mead said, indicates most of the sweaters have been sold by peddlers, not retail stores.

Moore Park Ski Tow On Docket

Negotiations are underway to have a ski tow installed at the Moore Park ski area, Recreation Director Bob Bonney has announced.

The tow may be secured from Ed Chubb, operator of the tow concession at Crater Lake National Park which was forced to close because of deep snows and lack of skiers in that area.

Bonney said if negotiations are successfully completed the tow would be available to local skiers at a nominal fee per person.

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
