If you must fold a rubber garment for storing purposes, use dusting powder between the surfaces that touch.

More than 300 men and women from 24 counties in Oregon are expected to attend the 18th annual 4-H Leaders' Conference at Oregon State College Jan. 22, 23, and 24, announces L. J. Allen, state 4-H leader.

Emphasis will be on understanding the club member. Miss Joy Hills director of teacher education and certification, state department of education, will lead discussions. Miss Hills will also present the club leader.

The 1952 conference will be especially helpful to first-year leaders, according to Mrs. Alice Lindsay, Grants Pass, president of the Oregon 4-H Leaders' Association.
