Judge Denies Game Appeal

A motion by Atty. George Proctor for return of a 30-30 rifle, a beaver carcass and piece of deer meat, claimed illegally seized by State Police from Barney Walters of Bonanza, has been denied in District Court.

Walters was arrested in late December by State Officers on charges of possession of untagged deer meat and unlawful possession of untagged beaver. The court denial of Proctor's motion was based on game code provisions allowing officers to make search without a warrant of out-houses and other buildings except private dwellings wherein game or game fish may be believed to be kept and wherein violation of game laws is suspected.

Walters was scheduled to face trial Jan. 22 on the charges, but filing of the motion by Proctor delayed the trial. No new date has been set.

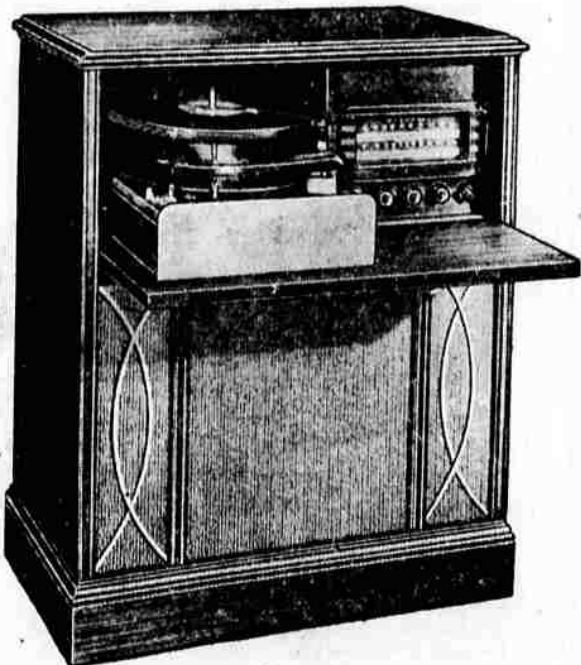
