SEATTLE (AP)—A Grants Pass, Ore., sailor who now is at sea aboard a submarine, spent his last night before leaving as a television star.

He is Hollis M. Hill, a graduate of Southern Oregon College of Education and a former Grants Pass school teacher.

Hill learned to play the bagpipes at Southern Oregon. He was playing in the mess hall of the Navy Receiving Station Friday noon when band members asked him if he wanted to appear on television. He did, and that night he was star of the Armed Forces Show.

She admitted to being 79 years old, but friends said she was in her 80's. One said 83.

The "eternal soubrette" made a glamorous career of seeking the Fountain of Youth.

Her efforts to stay young—they permitted her to play a 14-year old girl when she was at least 40—made her an international celebrity for more than half a century.

Poor Farm Waste Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some two million families are struggling on unproductive farms when the United States needs more food and more industrial workers, says the National Planning Association.

The problem, it said also in a report on farm under-employment, hampers Congress' attempts to "solve the ills" by distorting average farm incomes.

The report was released Sunday by the association, a non-profit, non-political organization of leaders in industry, agriculture, labor and the professions.

It cited areas in which it said families were not getting as much out of their farms as they could. Reasons included insufficient land, lack of capital, unsuitable methods and isolation from markets.

Detroit River Burial Held

DETROIT (AP)—The first official Detroit River burial since 1812 was held Sunday to fulfill the deathbed wish of a schoolman who loved the water.

The ashes of Christian T. Anderson, 46-year old Detroit Board of Education secretary who died Jan. 9, were committed to the river waters with rites from a United States Coast Guard buoy tender. Standing by was a Detroit police harbormaster tug.

Men of the Detroit Power Squadron said the river burial was the first in 130 years.

A Navy lieutenant commander in World War II, asked that his remains be placed in the river he had known since boyhood.

PORTLAND (AP)—A teen-age couple, married only a few hours, and six other teen-agers were injured early Sunday in a two-car collision on the Lower Columbia River Highway.

The couple, Donald Matlock, 18, and his bride, Betty, 17, were returning from a wedding barn dance, sheriff's deputies said. Their car caught fire after the crash but the Matlocks and three passengers were pulled from the flames.
