

Britain To Cut Imports

LONDON (AP)—The Conservative government declared Tuesday Britain must slash her imports by another 150 million pounds, or 420 million dollars a year to help head off national bankruptcy.

The cut, which comes on top of another of 350 million pounds ordered two months ago, was announced in the House of Commons by Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler.

The government called on the British people for a supreme effort to step up production and export earnings.

Butler said Britain's economic plight is so grave it threatens the stand of the free world against Communist aggression.
