PORTLAND (AP) — Suffocation in an early morning fire ended a frantic attempt of a man and a woman to flee the flames in a two-story duplex house Thursday.

Their bodies were found in a corner of the living room, not far from the bottom of stairs down which they apparently ran.

Police identified the victims as Mrs. Wilda May Pattee, 28, resident in the duplex on S. E. McLoughlin Boulevard, and William F. Pearson, 28, whose home was on West Slope Drive.

Flames were confined to a bedroom but smoke and heat caused damage to most of the other rooms.

### Sugar Beet Aid Asked

WEISENER, Idaho (AP) — An appeal has been made to President Truman for federal aid for Idaho and Eastern Oregon sugar beet growers whose crops still are unharvested.

State Sen. Clark Hamilton wrote the President asking if a federal agency could loan beet growers up to \$2.40 a ton, the subsidy price, for beets remaining in the ground.

Hamilton said the loan would cost less than \$200,000, but would enable many farmers to continue operations on a small scale until their 1952 crop could be harvested.

Hamilton said about 3,500 acres of beets are unharvested because a short labor supply was unable to dig the beets before the ground was frozen solid.

He estimated the loss to farmers at nearly a million dollars.

### Pacific Highway Has Snow Pack

SALEM (AP) — Packed snow covered the Pacific Highway over the Caskious and the Old Oregon Trail through the Blue Mountains, the State Highway Commission said Thursday.

Motorists were advised to carry chains on those routes. Chains also were recommended in the Santiam Pass, Warm Springs and Austin areas.

The Bellevue-Hopewell highway was closed by high water.

### BOND SALE

SALEM (AP) — Pacific Power & Light Co. was authorized by Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heitzel Thursday to sell \$12,500,000 worth of its first mortgage bonds.

The bonds will be sold to 17 insurance companies and investment houses to finance the company's construction program, including the Yale hydroelectric project on the Lewis River in Washington.

**OLD-FASHIONED SUGAR COOKIES**

*Cream together:* 1/2 cup shortening or butter, 1 egg sugar. *Add and mix well:* 1 egg.

*Add and beat until smooth:* 2 teaspoons vanilla or lemon extract, 1 teaspoon vanilla or lemon extract.

*Sift together, then sift into mixture, working in well:* 2 cups Crown Flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder.
